This has been another challenging year for the VFMC as we have coped with the continuing fallout of the COVID epidemic. I would like to thank the committee and all the other club members who have contributed so effectively to keep our club functioning.

Although we have, again, made a modest financial loss this year, we should congratulate ourselves, not just for keeping our club functioning while many clubs and small businesses have failed, but for the support we have provided to our members and the broader folk community over the past few years.

Our proactive and innovative use of technology has maintained our engagement with our membership and provided support for many of the performers who support the club.

The financial security that the VFMC has built up over many years has been crucial to our survival. From time to time we are asked why we don't launch projects to make use of this money. It is good to know that we are able to support projects that we feel are important, but also prudent to maintain a financial buffer for the hard times.

As we emerge from the pandemic, it is clear that some people remain cautious of participation in social activities. As a club, we will continue to use services such as Zoom to keep all our members involved in our activities. We still face a period increasing costs while our income generating activities continue with reduced attendances. The incoming committee will need to work towards re-building the level of participation while being mindful of containing expenditure.

Again, I thank the committee and all our members for supporting the VFMC and for supporting each other during the hard times. Now let us all move forward with the same positive attitude.

Treasurer's report to the AGM

The finances have been submitted to Dainbridge Accounting in Ringwood East for checking. Other than the effects of the pandemic there were no outstanding issues, all bills have been paid in a timely manner, and reports have been presented to the Committee each month for their perusal and acceptance.

The finances of the Club are gradually returning to a level of normalcy after the disruptions of the Covid virus.

The total <u>cash balance</u> in the Trading account and the two Term deposits at EOFY is \$60,614, which is \$2,699 less than at the SOFY.

\$2,107 of this deficit can be attributed to one-off Capital Expenses in the purchase of electronic equipment - a laptop, a projector, sound bar etc., plus stage lights for the Concerts. This was required to allow remote participation in the weekly Sessions, the Concerts and the Dances. And the whole system works very well.

Very low bank interest resulted in a low return from the two Term Deposits. Since moving from the old Community Hall in Ringwood East to the Ringwood Uniting Church Hall rent has also increased over the last two years.

If this capital expense is taken into account the <u>nominal deficit</u> would be closer to <u>-\$600</u> for the year. Likewise if the term deposits paid a half decent rate... well I'm sure it would be close to positive.

After the auditor applies depreciation to stock and equipment, the Total Members Funds will be a little different to those shown on the Income and Expenses sheet but close.

Due to reserves in the bank the Club has been able to weather the challenges well. The financial position being nominally break-even I do not recommend any change to fees for the coming year.

Much credit goes to Bill Buttler for getting the comms aspect going. Mike Hassett has also assisted greatly in being able to quickly update the website. Thanks to Maree and Steve for convening, Ray and Joan for song and tune sessions, and all who help with set-up, pack-up etc. The Club now also has a library with a very extensive collection of books, thanks entirely to the efforts of Wal Tiedemann.




There were 9 new members this financial year, 2 who resigned & 17 from 2021 who haven't renewed their membership, an overall decrease of 10 members from last year.

As restrictions have eased we have started to get a few more bookings in the second half of this year.

Who have all played with the Billabong Band at different times throughout the year. Special thanks go to Stewart & Maree for allowing us to use their homes for practices.

Highland Games Report

This is the first year we have included a formal report on the VFMC involvement in the events run by the Committee of the Melbourne (formerly Ringwood) Highland Games and Celtic Festival.

I am a member of the Highland Games Committee, and I am responsible for organising the Folk Music Tent activities at each of the events run by the Games Committee. The Committee regards the Folk Music Tent as one of the 'four pillars' of the Games – the other three being the 'heavy' games (caber tossing etc), the Pipe Bands and the Highland dancing. Our involvement has grown to the point where this is not just another Billabong Band gig – my hope is that the VFMC will gain greater exposure and influence through this partnership, and therefore there should be a formal report back to the VFMC Committee and members at least at the AGM.

The background to our involvement goes back to around 2018. The then Ringwood Games had dwindled in influence and was struggling to maintain interest among the clans and other support groups. Alistair McInnes had visited our Tuesday sessions and saw the VFMC as one way of reviving interest. As a result, I joined the Games Committee and we were involved in two reasonably successful events in the Ringwood area. The Billabong Band were one of the acts in the Folk tent and I sourced and organised the program.

COVID-19 put a halt to further events, and the 2021 Games were postponed until March this year. This year's event was highly successful, thanks in part to brilliant weather and a centrally located new venue, at Eastfield Park in South Croydon. This location is now the headquarters of the Games and will help establish it as a regular local event. The Billabong Band performed well, and we were able to maintain a strong Community focus with several related groups from U3A, Sing Australia etc.

The other event this year was the inaugural Williamstown Highland Gathering and Celtic Festival, at Seaworks Maritime Precinct in July 2022. The event was a modest success financially but artistically very successful, particularly the Folk Music 'tent' in the Pirates' Bar. The Billabong Band was one of four acts for the day, Saoirse being one of the others. The Billabong Band presented a narrative with songs depicting the history of the Celts in Australia – which incidentally could be a candidate for a presentation at the National Folk Festival next year along the lines of some of our previous theme presentations. The VFMC gained great kudos with the Games Committee for our ability to pull in quality folk acts and organise a popular live venue. The Williamstown gig will be on again next year, as will the Croydon Games. The Games Committee has been offered Barassi Park for a Melbourne Games festival, but we will be sticking to two events only for 2023 to avoid straining our volunteer resources.

The Games connection has the potential to be a valuable one for the VFMC. The Games Committee invested \$2,500 in purchasing the Folk Tent Marquee for us this year. The VFMC has been offered storage space at the new building provided by the Maroondah Council at Croydon Park (I will provide details to the VFMC Committee separately). My vision for the future is that we can grow the Folk Music part of the Games to become a mini-Eastern suburbs Folk Festival over time.

Given the level of our involvement, I think there should be a formal report to the VFMC Committee at least twice a year, possibly before and after the March and July events. The VFMC Committee should also consider a modest sponsorship of the events next year to help gain exposure for our Club through signage and media presence. I will approach the VFMC Committee separately in this regard.
