SO NOW YOU HAVE TWO CHOICES - let me rephrase that. There are three choices and the third one wins more often than not - FORGET ALTOGETHER.

The vacancy on the Committee has been filled by Eddie Scott, who has been around the folk scene for a fairish while and is well-known to most of us. I think I speak for the rest of the Committee when I say that we look forward to working with Eddie. That's the good news - here's the bad. Sue Harriage also tendered her resignation (ABSOLUTELY NO CONNECTION BETWEEN THE GOOD AND BAD NEWS!!!!) so we are once again asking for volunteers, nominations and/or coercions. Our A.G.M. has always been in May, but last year it was decided that it was desirable to have the A.G.M. after the end of the financial year so that the Society's books can be presented, audited, and the audited balanced Treasurer's report tabled at the A.G.M. This means that the A.G.M. may be as late as August, so don't say "it's not worth nominating/volunteering just for a couple of months". On the other hand you are not putting your head on the block for a twelve month stretch either.

Sue's resignation combined with Lynne's change of work address is going to make a difference to the arrangements for the newsletter too, but I won't know how it will go until this one is finally in the mail. I may have to make a few changes. Both Lynne and Sue remain on the Newsletter Committee (staff?) and Sue has offered to assist in other things for the Society if required.

It seems that I spoke out of turn about Folk Victoria, and "got the bull by the tail" so to speak. I have been promised a corrected statement in time for this newsletter. I DID say that I was 't of "the inner circle", but it is also obvious that some modifications have been made to the first tentative ideas. However, that is not to suggest that it is any less effective. In fact the first venture, the Martin Wydnham-Read Concert, proved that it is effective profitable even. Congratulations are due to the organisers because it was a very good concert indeed at a ridiculously low ticket price. I enjoyed the concert very much, but I am bound to say that I liked the less formal club concert in Geelong better - that's just my own preference showing though. It seems to me that there is less difference in audience behaviour (noise level) be ween formal concert and informal club functions in Geelong than there is in Mel-That's probably unfair because there were a lot of our Melbourne people down at Geelong - maybe it's because I don't get to Geelong very often, and the programme content was more to my taste as well.

THE 1985 NATIONAL FESTIVAL WILL BE HELD AS PLANNED IN PERTH. As you know Victoria had agitated for a review on this siting because of our sesqui-centennial celebrations in that year. After considerable heart-seaching and a lot of attention to the financial aspects (possible commercial and/or government sponsorahip) and the cost involved, as well as the obvious possibility of generating ill-feeling between the states, F.S.D.S.V. Committee decided unanimously to withdraw the pressure for re-allocation of the 1985 Festival venue. We realise that quite a few of our people will be downhearted about this, but there will be other years.

You will notice the enclosed sheet about the Australian Music Centre, and no doubt you will wonder why the insertion of a Sydney-based advertising sheet. Read it right through, and you will see that it applies to Australia, just as it says. There is a possibility which we hope will come to fruition that the Centre will open a branch here in Melbourne in the fairly near future. We are after all in-laws of a sort, since the Australian Folk Trust and the Australia Music Centre are both financially assisted by the Music Board of the Australia Council and have common interests as well.

The above nativity was very well attended and a tremendously enjoyable evening with a great programme. Could have done with elastic walls in fact. Extraneous noise from the bar will not be a problem in this club, although on a hot night with windows open the traffic on Nicholson Street is noticeable. The traffic noise can usually be filtered out by the human ear in a most amazing fashion, whereas the groups singing and the general hub-bub from the back bar at the Rainbow was difficult to "tune out". The entrance to the Club is on Westgarth Street, and parking is pretty reasonable too, at least it costs nothing.

Before I go any further, I must apologise to "Parradiddle" for the "stuff-up" regarding the dances they run on 2nd Friday each month. Alterations for the Activities Sheet tend to be abbreviated and my handwriting is none too neat at the best of times, so what I put in as W'town came out as Newtown. I hope none of you enthusiastic dancers went down to Geelong - I don't imagine any of you went to Sydney. Sorry folks.

I have been told about several functions for Bush Fire Relief fundraising, but unfortunately this newsletter will not be out in time to advertise most of them. V.F.M.C. has a collection tin at their dance on Saturday night, and it seemed to be getting pretty weighty -I imagine other clubs will be doing the same sort of thing, I hope.

I did not get notice of the new A.G.M. date for the Traditional Social Dance Association of Victoria in time to include it in the last newsletter. The first chosen date had to be abandoned for lack of attendance, but the A.G.M. was then held on 17th February at which time there were several changes in the Committee. The new Secretary is Bett Davis, 7 King William Street, Preston, 3072 (478 9656 AH) and she will be only too willing to answer any queries.

For those of you who are not aware of the relationship between our Society and T.S.D.A.V., we have reciprocal arrangements with them, in the same way as we have with several other groups.

I quote below some excerpts from a personal report from the President of the T.S.D.A.V. (Shirley Andrews) - I thought you might be interested because they are obviously facing the same problems as we had and to a certain extent still have. Please note that it is not the full report.

This year started off well with the Weekend Seminar held in Bendigo during the last weekend in November 1981 and reported on by Fay McAlinden in the TSDAV Magazine No.2. Otherwise the year has not been a very satisfactory one from the committee's point of view for a number of reasons. One was the disappointing level of support for our dayschools and here committee members have found themselves somewhat baffled. We deliberately included different styles of folk dancing, not because we personally preferred these but because we believed from comments made by members that they wanted to experience a wide range of dancing styles. We were then rather indignant to find ourselves the target of considerable criticism. It now appears that the members who favoured this sort of variety must have been a small minority but a very vocal group who had made themselves heard.

This conflict between those people who are looking for stimulation and entertainment through variety and those who want to concentrate on those styles which are already an established part of the Australian dance tradition is making it difficult for us to fulfill our main aims of raising the standard of Australian traditional dancing and spreading the knowledge of its traditions. I have also heard criticism to the effect that we are not doing enough to spread this knowledge but are concentrating too much on our members and supporters. When we first set up the TSDAV we saw our first job as developing the standards of those dancers who were to act as our first line of representatives. Also, in order to extend our work into wider circles, we needed funds which could only be raised from members' subscriptions and by running functions such as our dayschools and seminars; however, this year these had not made a profit prior to November 1982.

In spite of the criticism of some of the styles of dancing included, the workshops were still well attended both at the March and September dayschools in Geelong and the June one in Melbourne but the evening Ceilidhs have not been even when we engaged a good band (i.e. Smith's Gully in June) hoping that this would be an attraction. Although this function had been publicized by circulars to members and in the F.S.D.S.V. newsletter, it didn't get the support from local dancers that we might have expected. We had hoped to raise extra finance over the cost of running the dayschools by attracting extra people to these evening functions. As this has not been successful, and in view of our present financial situation, we would suggest that in future dayschools, the evening function should be something like a barbeque or simple social get-together that would not involve the expense of paying for a band, etc.

We also propose that two dayschools plus the weekend seminar would be sufficient for next year especially since it would not be practical to have a day school during the last weekend in March as Easter falls on the following weekend. Bendigo has followed up our request that this next day school should be organised so that it did not need a large financial outlay by suggesting a Rotary camp in their district which can provide overnight accommodation for as little as \$2 per person in dormitories. Further details will be given later.

Apart from our dayschools and seminar, other activities this year included the publication of No.2 of the TSDAV Magazine. Several committee members helped by writing articles and reports for this but the main work associated with the assembling, setting up and printing of the material, which involved a great deal of hard work, was done by Karen Pitt. We have not had as much support in the sale and distribution of this magazine from our members as we had hoped for and certainly not enough to justify the amount of work that went into its production.

The Committee has been working under extra difficulties this year as several members, including me, were away from home for several months during the year. We were sorry to lose the valuable services of Bruce McClure who was transferred interstate by his firm and has not been able to attend recent meeteings or functions. We have found it difficult to get helpers for the mundane jobs that have to be done at dayschools, etc. especially in Melbourne and in June had to depend on Bette Davis' group of Rangers who kindly assisted with tea making and other chores.

In the circumstances which I have outlined, it has been particularly discouraging to hear such a range of criticism that the committee hasn't done this or that. Such criticism is all too often made without any accompanying practical suggestions as to where the forces to carry out the work were to come from or the money to finance it. I would like to try to analyse briefly some of the motives for this criticism and to put it into some sort of perspective with the relation of the TSDAV to the folk scene and the general attitudes within this scene. Now, of course, Australians are notorious as a nation of "knockers" and the sport of armchair criticism is almost as popular as football and cricket, so I suppose anyone foolish enough to undertake any organisational responsibility just needs to develop a thicker epidermis. But it often seems to me that this sport of armchair criticism reaches somewhat Olympic proportions within the folk scene.

In the commercial entertainment world, managers and agents have to be paid by the performers but around the folk scene it has always been taken for granted that organisers will do all the mundane work for nothing but performers must be paid. Now as I have already survived some 23 years spending a lot of my spare time doing unpaid work around the folk scene, everyone will surely realise that I am not making a plea for organisers to be paid. I am merely pointing out the anomaly and the injustice of expecting people to do a lot of hard work in organisation without any appreciation, and a lot of kicks and hard words instead.

I had hoped when we started the TSDAV that we could avoid the strongly commercial aspects which I believe are slowly strangling the more genuine elements of the folk scene. I remember as one of the organisers for the first two National Festivals in 1967 and 1968 that we had hoped to run these along the lines of the famous American Newport festivals where all performers, whatever their status, were paid only a small nominal fee. That idea didn't survive and the expenses of running these festivals have now become astronomical. Similarly, I had hoped that we could run the TSDAV dayschools and seminars using those people who supported our aims and paying only those professional people we needed to engage from outside TSDAV circles. But not everyone agreed with this idea and so finance remains a major problem.

As it happens that some of the work I've done in the past has helped to create the opportunities for many other people to make money, for example, by playing in one of the multitude of bush bands, I have recently become more than a little fed up with much of the negative criticism of the dancing scene that has been drifting around, particularly in Melbourne. Some criticism I accept philosophically. It is perfectly normal for younger people to be sure they can improve on the ideas of anyone older, but I do expect my younger critics to demonstrate a fair knowledge of the real traditions of Australian social dancing. On the other hand, I think it would be an excellent idea for us to impose a limit of three years on the time any one person can hold the position of President in the TSDAV.

One type of criticism that I find absolutely infuriating parallels that of the brash art patron who says "I don't know anyting about art but I know what I like". I would seriously ask dancers when pushing their own individual tastes in dancing to be sure that these tastes really do reflect the best standards and true traditions that TSDAV should be promoting. I may be wrong, but I also suspect that I have heard some echoes of a parochial sort of jealousy from just a few Melbourne people towards the other centres. Now it is obvious that the smaller, more tightly knit groups from Geelong and Bendigo would find it easier to work together. Both of these groups have provided very strong support for the TSDAV committee, Geelong on the organisational side and Bendigo on the revival of the real Australian tradition. We must remember that it is the distortion of that tradition by city dancers and musicians in the revival of Australian dancing that has made the work of TSDAV necessary to try to restore a proper balance.

We have not been very successful in interesting many musicians from bush bands in the work of the TSDAV so far. One difficulty is that our functions are usually held at weekends when they are likely to have bookings. However, in defence of TSDAV, I would claim that a more serious barrier to overcome is the lack of understanding by so many musicians that the nature of social dancing means that the dancers are the final judges of the suitability of the music being played, not the musicians. We need to find some formula for breaking through this barrier. One musician who has given outstanding assistance to TSDAV dayschools and seminars is Rowan Webb and we are very grateful to him for his continued support. This year he has been ably assisted by Helen O'Shea and Graham Smith at the Geelong dayschool and also the November 1982 seminar. We wish there were more people like Dave de Hugard who travelled all the way down from Lithgow in N.S.W. just for payment of his airfare to give a workshop and play at the evening Ceilidh at the November 1982 seminar.

We hope that in 1983 we may see some more positive support for the aims of TSDAY. One urgent job that we would like to be able to get on with as soon as possible is the recording on video of some of the older traditional dancers at Nariel and at some of the other centres where Peter Ellis has been doing his valuable research.

As a postscript to this report - your beloved Editor gettting in her two-pennorth if you prefer - I agree with most of Shirley's opinions. Except that some time ago my roving reporter (who is securely based in Melbourne again now) offered some criticism of the music at the last V.F.M.C. Ball, and Shirley disagreed with his ideas on waltz tempo. At the time I agreed with the R.R. and since dancing to and listening to Wedderburn Oldtimers Band (whose tempo Shirley recommended) I find I still agree with R.R. - I have no trouble at all with keeping to the tempo played by Wedderburn Oldtimers, and I did have trouble at the V.F.M.C. Ball. Now whether it was actually tempo or whether it was evenness that was the problem I wouldn't be prepared to say, but problem there was.

Incidentally please note on your Activities Sheet that the V.F.M.C. Autumn Ball is on the 28th May at Central Hall, Brunswick Street, Fitzroy - Tickets \$5.00, available by post only from P.O. Box 83, East Melbourne (S.A.E. required). I am told the programme is fully arranged but the band has yet to be decided upon.

BENDIGO DAY SCHOOL (T.S.D.A.V.)

SATURDAY, APRIL 23RD AT THE AXEDALE ROTARY CLUB YOUTH CAMP

Axedale is 20 kms this side of Bendigo on the McIver Highway which runs from Kilmore to Bendigo.

Although Bendigo is rather a long way from other centres for a day visit, this problem has been solved by the Bendigo committee of the Sandhurst Dance Club who have suggested the use of this camp where overnight accommodation is available in dormitories for only \$2 per night. There are facilities for showers, cooking, etc. and camping is also possible for people who prefer to bring their own tents. The Bendigo committee has also kindly volunteered to provide sandwich lunches on the same basis as at their weekend seminar which will be a great help for dancers. Keep this date free.

Well I have received the statement on Folk Victoria, and here it is: FOLK VICTORIA - TO SET THE RECORD STRAIGHT

FOLK VICTORIA is a new initiative aimed at gaining a higher profile for folk.music and dance in Victoria, and was agreed to by the Folk Song & Dance Society of Victoria committee late last year.

The readily identifiable and remembered name, and new types of activities being undertaken are aimed at raising the public's knowledge, and the image of folk music and dance.

Through the FOLK VICTORIA thrust it is hoped that increased cooperation will be fostered between clubs and organisations involved in presenting folk music, dance and other aspects of the folk heritage.

It appears that increased co-operation and collaboration has already begun.

ORGANISATIONALLY, the move involves the adoption of "Folk Victořia" as the registered business name of F.S.D.S.V. to be used for events and propmotions which might raise the public consciousness of folk music dance and heritage in Victoria.

The FOLK VICTORIA thrust is an integral part of F.S.D.S.V. activities, although it brings together and strengthens aspects of F.S.D.S.V. activities which are aimed at improving understanding of folk music.

As a result, the impetus of Folk Victoria has prompted the introduction of new activities and new involvements, whilst financial and operational accountabaility is still retained by the F.S.D.S.V. Committee.

SPECIFICALLY, the name Folk Victoria will be used for initiatives which are aimed at spreading information about the State's folk music activities at a broader level.

The name will also be used for "high profile" events such as Euroa Wool Week and the Martin Wyndham-Read concert.

One of the first moves was Folk Victoria's organisation of a very successful bush dance at the opening of Euroa's widely-publicised "Wool Week".

Another of the initiatives was the establishment of the monthly FOLK VICTORIA calendar which presents information on as much folk activity as possible, not just the long-established events and clubs run by F.S.D.S.V. itself.

More "New Initiatives" are being evolved, and there are encouraging signs that the growing co-operation and a higher profile might eventually increase awareness and understanding of the folk heritage.

It is hoped that as public understanding grows, the various government bodies and local companies will finally realise the importance of helping support the general folk music, dance and heritage scene throughout the State.

Finally, it must be reiterated that FOLK VICTORIA IS F.S.D.S.V.

Australian Folk Trust Inc. - Report

Another AFT meeting was recently held, this time in Sydney on the weekend of 15th - 17th January. Many thanks are due to Geri & Phyl Lobl for their organisation and hospitality, and for the use of their home for the first two days of the meeting. The third day of the meeting was with representatives of the Australia Council, and the Australian Music Centre. This was preceded by a luncheon with these groups, which was funded by the W.A.F.F.; again many thanks.

The full details of the meeting will be available shortly through the minutes. However a summary of themajority of the topics discussed is given in the Chairman's Report in the latest issue of the AFT Journal (which should be enclosed with this newsletter) and several other points are covered in further detail in the Journal. Attention should be drawn to the continued Grant scheme and everyone is urged to consider applying for support for projects through this scheme. A special grant, for collection of the Australian Folk Heritage has also been established (see below). The cataloguing project has also now produced a published listing under the careful guidance of Graham Seal; only a limited number of copies (200) were printed so anyone interested in purchasing a copy should act quickly (full details in the Journal).

In your February Newsletter there were comments about organising weekend festivals that seem to flow with ease which prompted me to let you know just how well the Banana Republic can do the job - and I don't mean Queensland!

The 1st Coffs Harbour Folk Festival was put together by the Washboard Folk Club in about four months. The club itself is only 18 months old so they are not really experienced at this festival business. The results were not only a credit to the festival committee but were so smooth that I wish some Nationals were up to their standard.

Firstly, the venue: The Club usually meets in the dining-room of a large hotel on the main thoroughfare so negotiations with the publican were the first on the agenda. The Fitzroy hotel provided Bed & Breakfast at modest prices for such as myself who wanted a holiday from anything like household chores and there were such spacious grounds at the back beyond the beergarden that many people could camp there and for the princely sum of \$1 could enjoy the showers, etc. of the hotel itself. Bars, lounge and garden offered space for concurrent jam sessions from Friday to Monday; workshops were in the dining-room; and, within walking distance, the Civic Centre was used for a concert on Saturday evening and a dance on Sunday.

Secondly, the programme: Workshops were organised at two-hourly intervals but were not intended to last all that time. The important factor to me was that there was a relaxed atmosphere about attending a workshop, having a break and then going back for the next one without the awful feeling that one wanted to be in two (or more) workshops at the same time and having to rush to get anywhere. A good range of topics was covered by Tony Walsh, Robin Connaughton, Mary-Jane Fields, John Dengate, Margaret Walters and The Kalangers. There were a couple of others but there was some sight-seeing to be done. For those who are not interested in going to workshops there was always music close at hand and beaches not far away.

Saturday's concert was compered by Bernard Bolan and acts from Sydney, Brisbane, Coffs Harbour and the surrounding countryside provided a good cross-section of performers. This concert also included the awarding of Certificates of Citizenship of the Banana Republic to concert performers by El Presidente (who is appointed by the local council). Earlier the Washboard Folk Club had won the coveted award of the Ripe Banana for its contribution to the Republic!

Even the heat didn't daunt the enthusiasm of the dancers on Sunday night. Music from Tallowood (looking somewhat unusual with short-back-and-sides from their recent cameo role in "Winds of Jarrah"), The Kalangers (who by contrast looked like wild men from the bush) and the Big River Bush Band was played with gusto to tantalise toes but at a speed which the rest of the body could keep up with.

For the people of Coffs Harbour a Free Concert in the park entertained them on Sunday afternoon - the idea being to bring Folk to the folk who otherwise may not have heard what richness we have in our Australian performers and culture.

Unfortunately I had to leave before the Chorus Cup which I heard brought out the best from the weekend's participants. Coffs Harbour won and they were presented with a Yard-glass - not empty - which is to be held on show in the Fitzroy with an engraved plaque for next year's winners.

Added to this was a 2-hour broadcast Live from 2 CHY FM, 6-8 p.m. on Saturday (what a way to publicize a concert!) and recording for a Special on the A.B.C. - you might like to check out when this will come to air. There were Morris dancers and, believe it or not, they did not overwhelm everyone else - on Sunday morning they took themselves off to the local market and astonished some of the old chums. All this sounds like a very regimented weekend but the reverse was true - the organisation had been done so well that when the time came it all looked too easy. I'm sure it wasn't but the results we're sufficiently inspiring for someone to want to start a folk club himself!






