The Society is incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Act (1981).

The Society is recognised as representing Victoria in matters involving all forms of Folk Arts, and as such is a member body fo the

AUSTRALIAN FOLK TRUST
(P.O. Box, 265, PADDINGTON, Q'1d. 4064)

which is the National body through which Federal Government funding is devolved via the Australia Council for the Arts, to the various State (member) bodies to assist in the promotion, preservation and presentation of the Folk Arts. The A.F.T. uses these devolved funds mainly to sponsor and support the folk arts on a National level, e.g. National Folk Festivals which are held annually in a different State each year. Folk Music has a particularly effective representative on the Music Board of the Arts Council in the person of PHYL, LOBL, 244A Connell's Pt. Rd., CONNELLS POINT, 2221. Two delegates are chosen by the Committee of each State (member) body to serve on the A.F.T. for two-year terms, and may be re-elected at the end of these terms.

The Society tries to stagger these two-year terms for obvious reasons. The origin impetus for the formation of the A.F.T. came from Victoria, and almost continuously since its inception a Victorian delegate has been an office-bearer. Our present delegates are LYN HOARE (A.F.T. Treasurer) who has just begun her two-year term, and JOHN RAMSHAW who will be retiring at the end of the year.

The Society is affiliated with, or has reciprocal membership benefits, with other groups whose aims are in accord with the aims of the Society, such as the Victorian Folk Music Club, the Colonial Dancers, the Geelong Folk Club, Overlander Folk Club (Dandenong), Dan O'Connell Folk Club, Troubadour Tuesday Night Club, Wangaratta Folk Club, Shepparton Folk Club and others at the discretion of their organisers, including Folk Clubs run by our equivalent organisations in other States.

The Society's Folk Club is the MELBOURNE FOLK CLUB (at whatever venue), but the Society also sponsors other Clubs and functions, and in co-operation with the Colonial Dancers organises a regular (1st Sunday each month) afternoon dance at the Cpriton Community Centre, 150 Princes Street, CARLTON.

The Society's meetings, held monthly (2nd Tuesday of the month subject to confirmation; see Activities Sheet) are open to all interested people, whose views and suggestions will be heard, but voting rights are limited to members of the Committee.



I may be getting ahead of myself - I may have no say at all in what goes into the Newsletter. Whether I continue or not is up to the new Committee at its first meeting.

Dave Moss' poem has drawn fire from one of our Melbourne folk who admits to being talented - which he is without a doubt, and I have heard him only in a Club situation where pick-ups are not mandatory; there is of course P.A. and his dulcimer - very nice listening.

Dear Dave Moss & Co.

I don't know who you are but I read your poem and wish to correct some inaccuracies in it. "Cobbers" have never used electric instruments; all instruments are acoustic instruments that have pick-ups in them just like John Fitzgerald's fiddle or Peter Anderson's accordian and many other folk musicians of great ability.

The other point I wish to make is that my own "first experience" of any dance music was those very two bands that — were critisized in your poem-Cobbers and Bushwackers. It was after hearing these two bands on record and "live" that I started attending folk concerts and pub sessions and festivals etc. These experiences led me to playing folk music(i.e Denis O'Reilly, Shores of Botany Bay etc) which in turn led me to explore other folk cultures especially my beloved Bluegrass music and ,later, Irish Dance Music. I'm sure I'm not the only musician in this situation.

I've played many folk clubs and enjoy the set-up; walk in with a few guitars (all tuned differently) a mandoline, fiddle and banjo (I have been told that I am somewhat talented-yes even by the purists) and sit down and play. But I could never make a living from it.

Now David (and others), sit down by your record player and have a listen to John Fitzgerald's break on Statten Island Hornpipe or the Armstrong Bros. version of O'Carolan's Concerto. It's great music even <u>pure</u> music.

Both of these tunes can be heard on Celts to Cobbers.

Our activities extend into schools as well. We perform 2 types of shows: a dance show where we teach children some of the simple dances (Brown Jug Polka, Gay Gordon'setc) or a "History through Australian Songs (unperverted). We also sometimes get half a dozen children up on stage to play a song with us and they play "rhythym" instruments which I must confess are not as <u>pure</u> as one would wish. Included in this is the dreaded Brazilian Maracas (shakers). We perform about 100 schools per year including country areas. Also we do have for sale a special dance tape for schools.

So David you're wrong. We are not only playing traditional music but we are spreading the word. We might not be doing it to your specifications but what are you doing to further folk music? Do you always criticize or do you say nice things about people occasionally? I won't forget the handshakes and congrats that I got from members of F.S.D.S.V when the news broke that I joined Cobbers. There is room in the world for the purist and the not-so-purist. I myself drink unpure Patra orange juice everyday but I also eat the occasional orange.

Finally, I am giving guitar lessons in both pure and unpure music forms to people of all ages (children most welcome) and banjo lessons in Pure Very Traditional Irish Music. Anyone interested can contact me on 481 8307. Please find enclosed a cheque for \$15.00 being payment for my year's subscription to F.S.D.S.V. I hasten to add that this money was earnt whilst playing and singing with "Cobbers".


I also know Dave Moss and his musical ability, and being nearer to Dave's age than to Tony's, I fail to appreciate the finer differences between electric instruments and acoustic instruments with electric "bugs". In fact I would go further and say that I think it is a little short of sacrilege to put "bugs" in fiddles and as far as I am

concerned "bugging" makes acoustic instruments electric instruments.

O.K. Peter Keuffer plays an electric bass and I like the way he plays it, but for my money I never wanted to hear the "Bushwhackers" again after hearing their first concert at Collingwood Town Hall after (I think) their first overseas tour - there was little electric "bugs" in everything including Tony Hunt's fiddle and made it painful to listen to. Regarding the "Cobbers" L have been blasted out of my seat by their "acoustic" instruments at Latrobe, and even though they were not making any money out of it I enjoyed their music better when they still called themselves "The Freewheelers" and played what I call acoustic music - with Blossom on the big acoustic bass guitar.

Besides that there is such a thing as poetic license (poetry also being a Folk Art) and "bugged acoustic sound" just wouldn't have Anyway, as I stated in the issue that has roused Tony's ire, total agreement ON ANYTHING is fundamentally impossible among "Folkies".

Remember the "folk" bit in the Barossa Valley after the Adelaide Festival last year? Well, they must have liked it up there in the Valley.

In 1982, The Boite presented a concert of the Drums of the World, and last year it was Stringed Instruments of the World.

This year, on October 6, The Boite completes the trilogy with a concert featuring the Wind Instruments of the World.



The concert is entitled From the Pipes of Pan, to remind us of the mythical origins of wind instruments. Pan was the Greek God of the forests, and was worshipped by shepherds because he protected their herds. Pan was half-man, half-goat and spent much time persuing nymphs. One of them, Syrinx, became frightened, and fled from him as he pursued her. She prayed to her sisters for help. They changed her into a bundle of reeds. Pan noticed that they made a sound when the wind blew across them, so he cut them into unequal lengths and tied them together. They are known as the Pipes of Pan.





This concert at the Collingwood Education Centre, will feature the diverse range of instruments that have developed since those ancient times:

- * the haunting flutes of the Andes (quena and zamponas)
- * the ancient Chinese bamboo mouth organ (sheng)
- * the Irish whistle and button accordian
- * the clarinet of the Greek nightclubs
- * the saxophone and accordian music of Brazil
- * the Yugoslavian bagpipes and the Irish uillean pipes
- * the Chinese flutes of the ancient Imperial courts (hsiao)
- * from the zurna of Turkey to the oboe of Europe

This short note is just to inform you all that Roger King and I are now acting as Co-ordinators of the Boite. For those people who may not be aware, the Boite has existed for about six years, run by a voluntary committee and a Government funded co-ordinator. Its purpose is to make the music of Melbourne's migrant population a bit more accessible to the rest of us. To that end, the Boite has organised multicultural concerts, some with a particular theme, such as "Highly Strung" from which a cassette and booklet were produced featuring stringed instrument traditions from seven countries as represented here in Melbourne.

Community music is another of the Boite's interests and it has run instrumental and dance workshops and community days as well.

On October 6th, we are presenting a concert of wind instruments, similar in concept to "Highly Strung". Martin Hanley will be holding the fort for the Anglo-Celts, there will be Pan-pipers, a Chinese hsiao player, a Russian accordionist and many others. As you can see from our ad., it offers plenty of variety and interest, so we hope to see lots of you there.

On another tack, I would like to encourage all of you with nimble feet, and those with willing hearts, even if the feet are not so nimble, to come to the International Dancing sessions we hold twice a month in North Melbourne. Now that Spring is in the air and evenings are longer and warmer, what could be nicer than to spend the first and third Tuesdays of each month bounding around a dilapidated church hall with lots of other enthusiasts! Do come along. The three months between now and Christmas look exciting with visits from some excellent dancers from the Spanish community, some Peruvians and possibly some Turkish-Cypriots and some Timorese dancers.

However, I will continue to do my utmost for the furtherance and weel-being of the Society. This will be shorter (sic) than usual to allow space for some legwork that someone out there has done for YOU! Viz:-

NINETEENTH NATIONAL FOLK FESTIVAL PERTH - EASTER 1985

As the Festival looms closer, I have tried to find the most economical way to travel.

Here are the findings to date:

AIR TRAVEL. ANSETT AIRLINES OF AUSTRALIA

GROUP TRAVEL DEPARTMENT.

Contact Mr. Ron Weston.

"APEX" fares are still available at a cost of \$423.50. This constitutes a 30% reduction from the normal ECONOMY CLASS fare.

Conditions;

- a). Full price of ticket must be paid within I4 days of booking.
- b). A minimum of seven days to be spent in Perth.
- c). Flight details cannot be altered unless 30 days clear notice is given.

Mr.WESTON intimated that any person wishing to travel under this scheme should book the ticket as soon as possible.

For those not willing to CHANSETT, T.A.A. should offer the same deal.

OVERLAND. If driving your own vehicle is not a possibility then only one option seems feasible - COACH. Train travel is slow, tedious and expensive.

After discussions with several coach operators the price for a seat on the normal scheduled service would be between \$80 and \$100. Most operators will accept group bookings to a maximum of 25 people. The duration of the trip would be approximately 46hrs.

SELF - DRIVE MINI-BUS. (I2 seater, endorsed driver's licence required for I3 or more passengers.

This means of transport would be ideal for those wishing to have a holiday in conjunction with the festival.

The computations of cost are manifold, but \$250-\$300 seems to be an average price.







THE CONFERENCE

This inaugural National Folklore Conference has been initiated by the Australian Folk Trust in order to provide a major venue for discussion of our Australian folk heritage. It will provide a forum for folklorists, collectors and others involved in folklore, folklore preservation and arts policy to examine and discuss a wide range of materials and issues.

THE PROGRAMME

The Conference programme has been developed by an invited committee which includes noted folklorists. This committee has selected a range of topics for inclusion at the Conference. These topics are:

- Collection and preservation of Australian folklore.
- · How should the folk arts be supported?
- · Children's folklore in Australia.
- Cultural preservation and cultural change in Australia today.

It is hoped that there will be a particular emphasis on the role of Australian folklore in present day society, and in the future, when changing patterns of work and leisure will put additional importance on individual participation in the arts. Discussion will include examination of the role of the Australian folk heritage in a multicultural society, and the position of folk arts and folk heritage in Government arts policies.

THE SPEAKERS

The speakers at the Conference will include invited keynote speakers plus those who wish to present material. In addition there will be discussion panels for some sessions.

Contributors will later be asked to provide an outline of their talk for inclusion in the Conference timetable, and may be invited to provide an article based on their presentation for inclusion in the published proceedings of the Conference.

The Conference will begin on the Friday night with registration and an informal mixer session. The formal Conference sessions will be during the morning and afternoon of both the Saturday and Sunday. On the Saturday evening registrants will have the option (at extra cost) of attending one of the two events outlined below.

TRAVEL


