The Society is incorporated under the Associations Incorporation Act (1981).

The Society is recognised as representing Victoria in matters involving all forms of Polk Arts, and as such is a member body fo the

AUSTRALIAN FOLK TRUST (P.O. Box, 265, PADDINGTON, Q'1d. 4064)

which is the National body through which Federal Government funding is devolved via the Australia Council for the Arts, to the various State (member) bodies to assist in the promotion, preservation and presentation of the Folk Arts. The A.F.T. uses these devolved funds mainly to sponsor and support the folk arts on a National level, e.g. National Folk Pestivals which are held annually in a different State each year. Folk Music has a particularly effective representative on the Music Board of the Arts Council in the person of PHYL,LOBL, 244A Connell's Pt. Rd., CONNELLS POINT, 2221. Two delegates are chosen by the Committee of each State (member) body to serve on the A.F.T for two-year terms, and may be re-elected at the end of these terms.

The Society tries to stagger these two-year terms for obvious reasons. The origin impetus for the formation of the A.F.T. came from Victoria, and almost continuously since its inception a Victorian delegate has been an office-bearer. Our present delegates are LYN HOARE (A.F.T. Treasurer) who has just begun her two-year term, an JOHN RAMSHAW who will be retiring at the end of the year.

The Society is affiliated with, or has reciprocal membership benefits, with other groups whose aims are in accord with the aims of the Society, such as the Victorian Folk Music Club, the Colonial Dancers, the Geslong Folk Club, Overlander Folk Club (Dandenong), Dan O'Connell Folk Club, Troubadour Tuesday Night Club, Wangaratta Folk Club, Shepparton Folk Club and others at the discretion of their organisers, including Folk Clubs run by our equivalent organisations in other States.

The Society's Folk Club is the MELBOURNE FOLK CLUB (at whatever venue), but the Society also sponsors other Clubs and functions, and in co-operation with the Colonial Dancers organises a regular (1st Sunday each month) afternoon dance at the Carlton Community Centre, 150 Princes Street, CARLTON.

The Society's meetings, held monthly (2nd Tuesday of the month subject to confirmation, see Activities Sheet) are open to all interested people, whose views and suggestions will be heard, but voting rights are limited to members of the Committee.

If in the future, the Committee decides to make use of commercial printing etc. the Society members will get exactly what we pay for and no more, as proven on our three issues where we At present the entire work is done by members changed printers. who do have a personal interest in the job, an attitude that we can hardly expect from a commercial concern since our job would be one of the minor ones (approx 250-300 copies). I can really only tell the person taking it over (if they are not too cocksure to ask) what is entailed in the "donkey-work" of getting it printed, collated, posted, etc. You see Folks, I have come to the end of my tether. I he been doing it for so long without a lot of problems (see previous reference to sub-committee) through many changes of management on the Committee, that succeeding Committees have just accepted the Newsletter as something that "happens" without much effort - I suspect the same

same attitude prevails among many of our members. noticeable that those who have done a stint as Editor (and there are quite a few) over the first seven years, are well aware that it does not just happen. I am well aware that I have more time than most that can be devoted to the Newsletter - but even so, that time is at the expense of other interests. I have the advantage of not having to go out to work, but over the past five years the work of the Society generally has taken up several hours a day in one way or another on average. Over the past year, I have also been disillusioned by the way many years of work by many people has been nullified and/or ignored by patchwork policies and ad hoc or unilateral decisions along with consideration of the Society's health, interests, credibility and organisation taking a back seat to personal interests, ambitions, concerns and tastes. Another trend which has been developing for about the last three years has been the "cell" system in the ranks of management in which information which should in an ideal system be made available as a matter of course to all Committee members (who after all were elected by you the general members to represent you and your interests) has been withheld on the expedient "need to know" basis. I find this abhorrent on two counts. We belong to a Society which is largely composed of people who resent any sort of restrictions or coercions, and such practices within the Committee of our Society appears to not only smack of double standards, but indicates a lack of trust which bodes ill for much effective work from your elected representatives.

Having wandered through my reasons for making the decision - the next Newsletter (December's) will be my last. There, I have finally said it - put it in writing in fact. I did state at the A.G.M. and the next Committee meeting that I wanted to finish at the end of the year. I had hoped that someone else would have come forward by now so that I could explain the "donkey work" and necessity for close co-operation with the Secretary, Newsletter Editor and Membership Secretary (part of the reason that I have been doing all three for such a long time, until the first two jobs grew to their present volume, was the need for quick exchange of information between the three jobs). However since no-one has.....

You know peoples, I knew there was a good reason for avoiding the social/personal jottings section - you can't keep up with it. Besides which it causes epidemics. (See President's Report).

The third weekend was back up the Calder Highway to Castlemaine to The Rock-Hopper's Opera, part of the Arts Festival - Jazz, Folk, Bluegrass, Rock, Skreitch, a Highland Piper to open the show, Tex Turkey and an amazing light show courtesy of Dreggles in an old quarry a few miles out of Castlemaine. Indescibable really, you had to be there to know what it was like.

Coming up soon, the 4th Horsham Folk Festival, with a great line-up, the last weekend of the month. ThenNariel and/or Hamilton's for Christmas and New Year (Hamilton's Dance will be on Saturday 29th December) and positively heaps in January including Geelong's Folk Music Bush Camp in the Otways, near Lorne the weekend of January 13th-15th. Places are still available for the Folk Lore Conference 23rd-25th November but not many - atleast 80 people are already coming from as far away as Queensland and Perth. A reminder also that the first Festival Fund-raising Raffle will be drawn at The Racecourse on Friday 23rd November. It promises to be quite a good night of local and inter-state performers with Danny Spooner, Kieth Mckenry and Peter Parkhill as definite starters and probably lots more floorspots. The rest of the year is either going to make or break The Melbourne Folk Club and that is in you, the audience's hands. You cannot complain about line-up - Mike & Michelle Jackson(30thNov.), Rob Foot, David O'Connor and Southwind (some-where over the Rainbow) (7th Dec.), Dr Foster's (14th) and Carols by Candlelight (21st).

Up at Euroa, Danny Spooner was telling me about an Australian Musical Play called "Flash Jim Vaux" which is being presented by the Geelong Repertory Society at the Blakiston Theatre November 29-30th, December 1st, 6th-8th and 13th-15th. In Danny's words, and I quote "...I think that many folkies will enjoy this play, it's rather like John Gay's 'Beggars Opera' - the music is great and most of the tunes are traditional songs of the period ... The story is based on a true character - James Hardy Vaux who was transported to Australia three times, the second time for life! It's about low life in London and Sydney, is bawdy, Funny and makes some very good points ... Spooner gets to play a London fence and a whore master who becomes a Colonial Secretary ... "Sounds interesting. It's good to see more theatrical folk action. Over in Perth they've recently put on "Larkrise to Candleford" at W.A.I.T. and are planning "The Transports" for the National. More local action will be the first of the long-awaited Master Classes. Future ones, early in the New Year will hopefully be conducted on a larger scale with Cathal Connel and Mary Bergin but for starters we will a one day class at Collingwood Education Centre on Sunday 9th December with Louis McManus and Phil Day. Sunday so that all you muso's out there can come - morning and afternoon sessions at the Ed Centre and a Ceilidh in the evening which will provisionally be at Carlton Community Centre, but maybe elsewhere if we can find a more suitable venue. Any ideas? Hopefully there will be more details elsewhere in this newsletter but if not, contact either Kelly Skinner or myself.

Finally, Neil and Marie Wilson are leaving the Commercial Club Hotel in the near future so we may have to look elsewhere. Do you want another Commercial-style Club? If so, where? When? How? With the new liquor laws, how does Sunday Appeal? I think all the musicians are keen to continue, how about you, the audience? Hello, a cheerio here from your friendly local A.F.T. Rep. Could you please make it be known via the newsletter that;

1, The "A.F.T. Fellowship" which is offered for the field of folklore collection is up for grabs again and the closing date is the 30th of November. The last fellowship was awarded to Mr John Marshall, of Finley, N.S.W. His project aims to document the folklore of a region, using a multi-faceted approach involving collection and collation of written, oral, visual and material sources. The standard of applications was extremely high last time the fellowship was offered so maybe anyone who missed out last time might like to give it another try.

2, The A.F.T. also runs a devolved grants scheme. Most people who read this newsletter should already have heard of it but for those who haven't, or who thought things like "that could never apply to me", or I'm not up to applying for someting like that" then I would just like to say that the Grants are available to anyone who puts in an application that the board of the A.F.T. sees as a viable idea that fits into the guidlines. Applications may be made for any type of folk oriented project such as:

original research, publication, field collection, recording, workshops, tours or festivals and may be in any field of folk song, folk dance, folk music, folk lore or folk craft.

Go on give it a try for your pet project. If you don't try then of <u>course</u>, you won't get a grant, nobody is going to waltz up and just offer you one! Besides, the more applications the Music Board and the Community Arts Board see us getting the more they know that we folkies out here are strong and in existence (if lacking in cash!). Just see Lyn Hoare or John Ramshaw for help and the necessary guidelines.

3. If anybody wants a copy of the A.F.T. Journal then they are available from John and Lyn. (You should have all got one in the newsletter anyway.)

FESTIVAL REPORTMALDON 1984 FROM A WANDERING SPOOK

Friday afternoon, heave the body out from behind the desk where it has been dutifully vegetating all day and leap out the front door full of the joys of life and an air of expectation....yes folks, its that time of year again. Off we all hoard, through the beauties of down town Kyneton, speeding expectantly through Marmsbury and Taradale, a positive wheelie through Elphinstone and a very quick stop at the Red Hill Pub in Chewton, then on to MALDON... Set up tent on the Friday night, where to go this year??? You meet a few people you know as you all enter into the sort of Maldon Lottery, where to camp in a "Yobbo free Zone". Having found one, fingers crossed, one takes out the essentials of life (Panadol, earplugs, Booze, Contraceptives), puts them near the "bed" and then goes out to do a round of the camp fire sessions. Saturday morning dawns bright and clear and fairly warm. We went in the town where every year I restock my garden from the stalls that the local women's groups hold in the fire station. You can buy lots of lovely plants and the odd Teddy Bear for very reasonable prices. Then back to the camp for a wonderful afternoon's entertainment. What can one say about this festival....and all for free. Makes one very glad of the existence of the little blonde lady at the table in front of the stage (complete with table cloth and flowers), for her parents, who everyone would love to have for parents, and for that loveable and eminant inhabitant of the Paris End, and M.C. Extraordinare, Roddy Read, esq.. One may see any type of music one wishes at the Maldon Festival, Mostly of a very high standard. Sitting behind a sign which reads "Performers, if you want anything, come and get yours...here" Helen takes orders for performances. At Maldon no one gets paid for performing, they all do it for the fun of it, and fun you can be assured of. Saturday night heralds the dance. To quote the red-headed one "You can catch the bus into Castlemaine or worry about the other sort of bus on the way back' (nuff said). The dance is a ceilidh band, (a well known band from Ireland, for those who didn't know) and everyone bops their slightly pink legs off. Back to Tarrangower Camp for more firesiding and unfortunately, the yobbos do a stirling job of making sure nobody gets much shuteye. Why do they bother is a much asked question on the bleary eyed Sunday morning. P.A. was heard to congratulate them on their brilliance, a point which, like everything else, went straight over their heads. 
