I repeat that in my opinion, they were the two best nights the Melbourne Folk Club has had for quite a while, and more such nights would woo back many of our old patrons - "old" in terms of loyalty not years.

In reply to statements made in separate parts of January's Newsletter by John Shorter ("just me"/President), he may be surprised (but shouldn't be) to know that I agree most heartily with his wish for a more harmonious time in the coming year, and also regret the ill-feeling that has badly marred the last year or so, but we obviously have very different views on both the cause and the cure for same.

I feel no need to defend my record of service to F.S.D.S.V. and its forerunners over the past fourteen years or so - the last ten end-on. During almost all of this time any members of the C'tee could request or be offered assistance, advice, co-operation and/or information from or by any other member, to enable them to do their work efficiently, but at the same time did not have to submit to interference and/or obstruction in doing that work; were working for the Society rather than our own ends? Firstly our Presidents were members of the C'tee who worked in whichever/they were best suited for the good of the organisation, on top of which they accepted the various burdens of the Presidency in the formal sense, in that they led the C'tee (and were perceived by the general membership to be the leader) by co-ordinating the efforts of the rest of the C'tee, delegating (after consultation with the C'tee) responsibilities and trusting those people to do the work they had agreed to do. If changes were needed they were made discreetly but not secretively, and certainly not without discussion with at least the persons involved. In other words a president has some power, but it has to be balanced by responsibility to his position, to his C'tee, to the aims of the Society and to the general membership. This power does not include being able to indulge in personal whims, fancies, antipathies and/or unilateral decisions affecting those areas of responsibility.

I know that John S. did not actually name me in his tirade, but by quoting my words in the context of "editorial comment", (along with some quite strange variations on same, and a remark about physical violence that quite eludes me) he makes it obvious that I am being referred to through the position I held until December, apart from restraining his indignation until after I had resigned from the position. Regardless of whether I was personally named or not, I must object most strongly to his implication, by juxtaposition of complaints, that I, as Public Officer - co-opted in May, 1984 to deal with the Association Incorporation, had any duties or responsibilities regarding the Company Incorporation which was already in force. It was the Company which was first summonsed and then fined by the Corporate Affairs Office. (Congratulations to Lyn Hoare and John Dick on what must have been some pretty good talking, in getting the late fee waived and the fine returned.)

To put members in the picture on this Incorporation business:
In the late '70s, the question of the Society becoming Incorporated as a Company with limited liability was debated at length in committee and several general meetings were held to ascertain the feelings of the general membership on the matter, since such incorporation would safeguard members and it was necessary to have the full agreement of all our members. I am not going into the involved and lengthy explanation of the why and how of that safeguarding here.

John Byrne was our President at the time the final decision to incorporate was made, and being in the legal profession, he was automatically "Johnny on the spot", although he was an exceedingly busy man whose main interests and considerable expertise lay more in legal fields other than Corporate Law.

John steered the business through and the Society became a Company, and according the the papers signed at the time, Corporate Affairs deal with the Directors of the Company in the case of an organisation such as ours the Directors are the office-bearers elected by the gneral membership at the A.G.M., i.e. <u>President</u>, <u>Vice-President</u> and <u>Treasurer</u>. The rest of the committee are their assistants if you like to put it that way. John was therefore Director (No.1?) and by virtue of his profession and the Committee's choice, he was also Legal Officer, and as long as he was an elected office-bearer or member of the C'tee, the rest of us were content to leave it to him. On the occasions that I raised the question of returns I was told, "Don't fuss, Jess. all under control! and I was quite to happy to leave it at When the new Associations Incorporation Act (198) was introduced, it was obviously so much better suited to the needs of our Society, that it was decided to change over, and John Byrne as Legal Officer agreed to get the ball rolling, but until the change over was completed we were still under the Companies Incorporation Act (1961). Unfortunately it was assumed by the Committee of the time that "getting the ball rolling" (I quote from notes taken at the time), meant actually doing the work as well - in effect acting as Legal Officer for the Company and Public Officer for the Association. As previously mentioned, John was a busy man and was just not able to give the needed time to this dual load. (In May, 1984 I found that Corporate Affairs Office had no record of F.S.D.S.V. except as a Company, so the new Public Officer had to start from scratch.) Subsequent elected office-bearers may not have been aware that they were also Company Directors. No doubt it was also assumed that they would have been told or at least have made enquiries as to what duties and responsibilities were entailed in their positions, or that they would have known from what had gone before. Obviously none of this has occurred in the last couple of years, hence our summons and fine for non-compliance with our legal requirements.

Lyn Hoare did do all the difficult and unpleasant work of sorting out the trouble at this end, with the assistance of John Dick (transferred in the middle of it to W.A.). John offered his assistance with the Associations Incorporation early in 1984 and suddenly found himself up to his neck in our Company prblems after the summons. Knowing that Lyn had that lot on her plate, along with her A.F.T. work, and was apart from that continuing to work on the Company affair even though she was no longer on the C'tee, simply to keep faith with the Society, I tried to have the Association Incorporation work completely ready to carry over im-I should have realmediately the Company was dissolved. ised that the logical thing for Coporate Affairs Office would be to continue to deal with Lyn for the Association Incorporation, but I didn't think of it. I could get no information from our President and Corporate Affairs could give me none since the Association Incorporation was not yet in force and I had no involvement with the Company affair, I worried myself into a fine old state as a result.

Meanwhile, a decision had been taken (by whom, when, where and under what circumstances I haven't a clue) that because I had been so ill, Lynne would follow through with the Association Incorporation. I appreciate the consideration, and had I only known of it I would have been thankful beyond measure. I have worked with Lyn and as a result have the utmost confidence in her competence, common sense and reliability. Lyn told me of this decision on

21st December (Carols by Candlelight at the Racecourse) too late for me to have thanked her most sincerely and congratulated her on a difficult job well done, in the last issue of the newsletter under my Editorship (the oddly numbered
one that John S. so carefully pointed out - proves he read it
carefully even while reaching for a paper bag) but I sincerely
hope that she will accept my thanks and congratulations now.
Lyn was very surprised that I had not known that she was following up the Incorporation business. It is hardly good
business practice to leave the new holder of a position to let
the previous holder of the position know of the change.

THE INFORMATION THAT I WAS NO LONGER RESPONSIBLE FOR THE WORK ON THE ASSOCIATION INCORPORATION IS THE NEGLECTED "NIPPING IN THE BUD" THAT WOULD HAVE PUT AN END TO ALL MY BITCHING AND GRUMBLING OVER THE LAST THREE MONTHS OF MY TIME AS NEWSLETTER EDITOR - IN FACT IT WOULD HAVE MADE MY LIFE A LOT HAPPIER IN THAT TIME TOO.

Having co-opted/nominated/appointed me to the position, the Committee (if it was the Committee) have every right to terminate the appointment on whatever grounds, but it is/was the President's responsibility to notify me or arrange that I be notified of the termination - not "the grapevine" method. It is interesting to note that Corporate Affairs Office still has me listed as Public Officer.

I would like to thank Peter for permitting me this space to give this detailed explanation and background, which will be the last I have to say in the Newsletter about it. I will not be called a liar or a slacker, nor will I take the blame (by implication or openly stated) for something for which I assumed no responsibility, nor will I be accused of ingratitude for assistance given. The people who know me will have made up their own minds and those who don't won't care since my involvement with the Society is now minimal. Peter has stated that he does not intend the Newsletter to become the vehicle for a long-drawn-out wrangle and I agree whole-heartedly with that sentiment - the job of Newsletter is quite enough without such problems.

In closing I would point out that John Shorter as "Just ma" usurps the position of John Shorter as President in issuing challenges to call an E.G.M. The President may wish to issue such a challenge - that is his right, it may be that he has on obligation of courtesy to call an E.G.M. to ratify or re-confirm the appointments of the entire Committee since all were originally elected under a different Constitution and Incorporation, but an E.G.M. is not necessary to remove "just me" as a member.

HI FOLKS,

Well, I'm at a loss for words! Welcome back everyone from whereever you've been. Good reports from the Long weekend festivals. I decided to have a rest and chuffed off up to Chewton en route to the Greendale Bush Fire Brigade's Annual Summer Sports Day only to hear on the radio (Barbara Horne, no less), just as we pulled off the Calder Highway, that it had been postponed due to the extreme fire danger that weekend. By the way, the Graham Squance Award looks very nice on Helen's wall.

The following weekend several of you were up at Eddie's place, I believe. For those who couldn't get up because of concerts, workshops, dances and the like, a bag was passed about to purchase a cetrain treasured pair of somethings for your man. The bag has not yet closed, so if anyone's still interested, please contact Kelly Skinner. I understand there's word from Eddie elsewhere in this organ.

The Concert - for those that were there it was a great turn. Everyone thought the atomsphere was wonderful including Paul himself, according to what he was saying on Rick Vengeance's radio show the following week. Several people expressed an interst in knowing if there were going to be more things on there - it was even likened unto Traitor's Gate in some quarters which is quite a compliment! Paul was great, as where Steve and Greg ("An inspired choice of support" quoth Suzette Watkins). Thanks to the Cricket Club Committee for their help and encouragement, to Andrew Patterson for the loan of P.A. and lights gratis (this time), to John McAuslan for all his help, both on the night and earlier helping to set up and those on the Committee wotknow who I mean. The only problem for that first night was that there weren't enough bodies through the door.

In keeping with my New Year's resolution not go on and on about the meaning of life, I'd like to show something out of the New South Wales Folk Federation's Newsletter:

"....The saddest news of the past month has been that after <u>four</u> months (my underlining!) im dry dock, and exactly one month at its new venue, the Victoria Hotel, Marrickville, the Folk Federation's Flagship, the Man O' War Folk Club, has run aground once more. The Victoria's publican apparently decided that the paltry turn-out each Saturday night did not justify his keeping the bar open to cater for our Folk Club. This is no time or place to apportion blame for this latest setback; the bone would in fact be pointed in many directions. But Eric Bogle, the subject of an extensive interview in this month's newsletter, gives us plenty of <u>food for thought</u> when he says:

"I am concerned about the folk scene in Australia ... There is not much happening. The level of musicianship is ten times higher than what it was ten years ago; there are more of us, and many people out there practising the art of folk club singing are very, very professional. The paradox is that today, people who go to folk clubs can hear a better standard of musicianship than they could ten years ago, and yet there are less people going along. Now that says something. What it says exactly, I'm not sure. But we have failed in our chance to hold the people we have attracted. That is mainly through some pretty bad organization and some pretty bad acts ..."

Bad organization and bad acts, it is a Catch 22 situation in which we find ourselves. If a folk club cannot get an audience of sufficient numbers, it cannot afford to pay good performers; if it cannot attract good performers, it cannot therefore attract large audiences, et cetera...."

I'm not sure if that was in December or January's Newletter but in their most recent one there is a notice from the Federation's Committee about a special general meeting that has been called for later this month, and I quote again:

"....The Federation needs the active support of its membership if it is able to fulfill its main objective: to present, support, encourage and collect folk music, folk dance, folk lore and folk activities as they exist in Australia in all their most genuine, historical, cultural and pleasurable forms.

It is important to note that the achievements and failures of the Federation are not the results of the efforts of the Committee; they are the results of the efforts of the Federation as a whole, and should therefore be shared by all its Members..."

Food for thought indeed. I hope that Eric and Paul Hemphill don't mind me quoting from N.S.W.F.F.'s Newsletter to show that we are not alone!

After having asked in the last umpteen epistles what you'd like to see and hear, when and where and having received no suggestions your dutiful Committee has tried to read your minds and taken your life (and money) into their hands at the last Committe meeting — which took two nights to get through, mind you! And the outcome is this, trying to please all of the people all of the time (thyme?) we are probably going to please no one, we're trying to cater for you all without knowing what you want (if anything). However this is what your Committee has come up with, for better or for worse, viz:

- *The Melbourne Folk Club rises yet again! But in a very different guise this time. The night will still be the same, i.e. Friday but the format will be different.
- *We will be running the Club at two different venues on alternate weeks.
- *FIRST and THIRD Fridays at the FITZROY COMMUNITY OVAL PAVILION.

Therefore the admission prices will vary but will be advertised well in advance. (We needed 85 people at the recent concert to break even and got 51).
- *The ROBBIE BURNS HOTEL (good name isn't it?) will run as an 'organised Come-all-Ye' somewhat along the lines of the Commercial but not quite!
- *The FIFTH FRIDAY SPECIALS will be as advertised well in advance.
- *If you get confused as to which Friday it is, both venues are within ten minutes $\underline{\text{walking}}$ distance of eachother.
- *The <u>PAVILION</u> is in <u>Brunswick St, North Fitzroy</u> (Melways 44 B2) on the old footy oval, nearby Edinburgh Gardens, on the far side of the grandstand near to the tennis courts (sorry I can't be more precise) It's on tram route 9, 10 and 11 and the tram stop is number 25.
- *The <u>ROBBIE BURNS HOTEL</u> is in <u>Smith St, Collingwood</u>, on the corner of Easey St and the Club will be in the back room, as are the Saturday afternoon workshops. It's on tram routes 88 and 89, tram stop 18.
- *The Robbie Burns will start on the 4th Friday of MARCH (22nd) with something a little different, to go with the baptism of the place and the second F.O.G. Raffle Draw (I hope you've all bought/sold your tickets) BIG John McAuslan, WEE Eric Purdie, RAMBLIN' Rab Mitchell and possibly OLD Louis. Like I said, not quite along 'Commercial' lines!

- *FIFTH FRIDAY SPECIALS will begin on Friday 29th MARCH at the PAVILION. If anyone has an eye for dates they will notice that this is a year to the day away from Good Friday 1986 when much bigger things will be upon us. These Specials will also be part of our "National Festival Benefits".
- *Friday 29th will feature the welcome return, for those of you who saw him in Melbourne at the Dan and 1-C-1, of DOUGIE MACLEAN supported by a duo new to the Melbourne Folk Scene - JOHN McAUSLAN and JOE PAOLACCI.
- *Dougie will be doing a workshop on the Saturday (at a venue t.b.a.) and playing at the Troubador the night before. These will be his only gigs in Melbourne and he will not be at Port Fairy.
- *The Pavilion will be set out as before with the possibility of some more formal seating, as in rows of chairs, at the front, for those who want a concert type atomosphere. Prior reservations for the Concert by calling 383 2706. Admission prices will be \$8 and \$6 for Members. Bookings for the workshop can be made by calling 383 5168.

So, there you have it, the Robbie Burns kicks off on Friday 22nd March and the Pavilion on Friday 29th March and then alternating weekly - first and third, second and fourth Fridays. This means the next M.F.C. night will be at the pub on 12th April because the first Friday is out-of-bounds being Good Friday. We hope you'll come along and support us!

We have been unable to arrange a gig with Martin Wyndham-Read due to other commitments but Don Williams and Andrew Patterson are putting on a Farewell Concert for him at the Universal Theatre on Sunday 17th March at 8 p.m. It will cost \$10 to get in with concessions at \$8.50 which includes Members of the Society. Tickets on sale now at the Troub and the Universal.

Now is the time for all you wonderful people who offered help in getting the National together to come to the aid of the party - please contact ot re-contact F.O.G. They still need an experienced minutes-taker cum secretary desperately. F.O.G. meetings are now held monthly on the third Friday - contact Lis Johnston as to where. F.O.G. made their first report to the A.F.T. at the Adelaide meeting earlier this month. They are also reporting regularly to the Society and there will be another report in yournext Newsletter. However, some important things that you should know about now:

- *As previously mentioned, the second minor raffle is now underway and will be drawn on Friday 22nd March at the Robble Burns M.F.C.
- *Tickets for a major raffle will be on sale in early March at a cost of \$100 dollars which may be paid off in 20 weekly instalements of \$5. The first prize will be "Round the World" air tickets for two persons to the value of approximately \$4,000. In addition to the major prize, there will be two tickets to the value of \$2,000 to any Pacific or South-East Asian destination. Third prize will consist of two prizes of \$200. 1973 - Left University prematurely to work as a tractorman, milkman, oil pipeline labourer, gardener etc. etc. while making music around Scotland in numerous semi-professional groups.


1974 - Dougie then joined Tannahill Weavers and toured extensively in the U.K. and Europe, playing fiddle, mandoline and sharing the vocals. Are Ye Sleeping Maggie was recorded while he was with the group.

1977 - Wanting to concentrate on his own music Dougie left the Tannahill and teamed up with fellow Scot Alan Roberts. They toured Germany, Holland, Switzerland, Austria, Italy and France and played at all the major European festivals. Together they made an album Caledonia which sold well and met with critical acclaim, as well as an album with Alex Campbell called C.R.M.

1979 - Alan gave up full time music, and Dougie teamed up with Edinburgh guitarist Donald MacDougall. This duo became a popular draw in Canada and England as well as Dougie's now familiar European venues. During this time his solo album Snaigow was recorded.

1980 - Dougie spent six months playing fiddle with the well respected Scottish band (and old school pals) Silly Wizard, touring with them in the U.S.A., Holland and Germany.

1981 - After seven years of rich and varied combinations Dougie decided to go solo, involving other musicians only for special concerts and tours.



Part of the trouble was that the committee organising the festival fell apart and the whole thing was arranged by just three people:

Dave and Glenda Sprigg and Jon Madin - all of whom worked really hard to get it running.

They were helped tremendously by the Kyneton Shire Council, and many of the local traders and they all deserve our thanks. Part of the trouble was that there was no publicity, due to the organisers being overloaded, although they did get a spot in The Age 'Weekender'.

A surprising inclusion on The Cobbers dance was the local Rap Dancing team, 'Rapchaps' — a group of ten year—old boys who busk on the streets of Kyneton and give the money to charity. Nice work lads! Keep it up.

The festival closed on Monday afternnon with a Come-All-Ye Concert, with John Beavis who is now living in Bendigo, some local performers, and some people attending the Festival.

In all it was rather quiet, but enjoyable affair, and I hope that next tear's is better attended!

Box 265, PADDINGTON, Queensland, 4064. which is the National body through which the Federal Government's funding is devolved via the Australia Council for the Arts, to the various State (Member) bodies to assist in the promotion, preservation and presentation of the Folk Arts. The A.F.T. uses these devolved funds mainly to sponsor and support the folk arts on a National level, e.g. National Folk Festivals which are held annually in a different state each year. It is also currently involved in lobbying for the establishment of a National Folklore Centre and State Co-ordinators for the Folk Arts. Folk Music has a particularly effective representative on the Music Board of the Arts Council in the person of PHYL LOBL, 214a, Connell's Point Rd., CONNELL'S POINT, 2221.

Two delegates are chosen by the Committee of each State (Member) body to serve on the A.F.T. for two-year terms, and may be re-elected at the end of these terms.

The Society tries to stagger these two-year terms for obvious reasons. The original impetus for the formation of the A.F.T. came from Victoria, and almost continuously since its inception, a Victorian delegate has be an office-bearer. Our present delegates are:

The Society is affiliated with, or has reciprocal membership benefits, with other groups whose aims are in accord with the aims of the Society, such as the Victorian Folk Music Club, the Colonial Dancers, Geelong Folk Club, Overlander Folk Club, Dan O'Connell Folk Club, Wangaratta Folk Club, Shepparton Folk Club and others at the discretion of their organisers, including Folk Clubs run by our equivalent organisations in other States.

The Society's Folk Club is the MELBOURNE FOLK CLUB (see details elsewhere), but the Society also sponsors other Clubs and functions, and in co-operation with the Colonial Dancers organises a regular dance at the CARLTON COMMUNITY CENTRE, 150, Princes St., Carlton on the first Sunday of the month (with the exception of January).

Society Committee meetings are held on the second Tuesday of the month (currently at the Robert Burns Hotel, Smith St., Collingwood from 7.30) and are open to all interseted people, whose views and suugestions may be aired, but voting rights are limited to Members of the Committee.
