# ~PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is not without some apprehension that I take on the role of President of the Folk Song and Dance Society of Victoria at a time when Victoria is about to enter a new era in the promotion of its cultural heritage. The recent establishment of the "Victorian Folklife Association" has created an unique opportunity for a diverse cross-section of Victoria's community to work together to raise the publics awareness and acceptance of the folk arts in this state. The Society has played a major role in providing this opportunity and I think it appropriate to continue this involvement by actively participating in the Association's programme.

I might also mention here that Hugh MacEwan and I have undergone a role reversal in relation to the Heritage and Folklife Centre project. Hugh has been elected to the committee of the, dare I say it, V.F.A. as the Society's representative and has subsequently been elected by that committee as the inaugural President of the Association. Congratulations, Hugh.

On a sadder note the Annual General Meeting was almost a non-event with 95% of the membership otherwise engaged. A rather pathetic display of appreciation for the efforts of the committee and a retiring President of three years standing I thought, but I suppose there are some who might think to the contrary. The incoming committee is very much the same as last year with a bit of a cabinet reshuffle (see inside front cover). There are still some vacant positions if you would like to see your name in print. I extend a warm welcome to Dinah Maxwell who is the only new face on the committee this year.

There were a couple of items on the agenda of the AGM that I would like to touch on briefly:

The first was the notice of motion to restore the membership year to the July/June format. This motion was moved as a recommendation from the outgoing committee who felt that the previous change to a flexible membership year, that is, one that runs for twelve months from the date of payment, was financially and administratively unsound for a voluntary organization the size of ours. Without going into the details of the debate the motion was carried and the mechanism for implementing the change will be reported on in detail in the next edition of Folkvine.

The second was the notice of motion to commit the Society to a policy of supporting the concept of a permanent home for the National Folk Festival. The acceptance of this motion, moved by Jamie Johnston, is perhaps quite timely given the editorial comment in the current issue of 'Australian Folk'. At this point in time the AFT have not received any offers to host the 1993 festival which is perhaps understandable given that the 1991 festival generated a \$20,000.00 loss on a budget of \$165,000.00 for the S.A. Folk Federation, Canberra is experiencing great difficulties finding sponsors for the 1992 festival with a budget of \$180,000.00. The AFT's ball park estimate for the 1993 festival is in the \$200,000.00 bracket.

The Folk Arts Administrator, Kathy Burgi has put the 'Folklink' database to good use in supplying the performers for the forthcoming "Waverley World of Dance". Kathy has worked in close liaison with Arts Waverley and was instrumental in the development of the festival programme. Are you registered with Folklink!

As a general comment, I would like to see the Society more actively involved in the promotion of folk events, and it is towards this end that I will be directing our energies during my term as President.

In closing I would urge you all to support the activities of the Society to the fullest. The more support - the more the enthusiasum.

# MELBOURNE FOLK CLUB REPORT 1990/91



Well, we have come to the end of another year of the Melbourne Folk Club. The last few months at O'Sullivans Hotel were not happy ones and we were forced once again to look for a new home. There were those who were dubious about the move from Fitzroy and Carlton to Brunswick, but no one would consider it a backward step now. Our new hosts at the "East Brunswick Club Hotel", Alan and Sue Chehab have not been able to do enough to help us and have been tremendously enthusiastic and supportive. We all settled in very quickly and hopefully the association will continue for many years to come. Our first birthday is coming up in October and big celebrations are planned.

As well as the Melbourne Folk Club, the Society has held many other events at the "East". It has proved to be an ideal venue for intimate folk clubs, sessions and larger concerts such as those featuring Katherine Tickell, Vin Garbutt and Rory McLeod, among others - even Sunday afternoon concerts for the kids. The move to Brunswick has also facilitated a closer liaison with Across The Boarders and the Brunswick Music Festival. The "East" was used as a venue for two events during the festival which were both highly successful.

We've had quite a variety of performers at the Club over the year. Many of the old favourites, plus beginners testing their wings in a friendly atmosphere. We have also had our fair share of musicians from country Victoria, interstate and overseas. One very pleasing aspect of the Club has been that well known performers from interstate have been dropping in when in Melbourne and delighting the crowd with a song or two.

There have been many great nights and memorable performances, but there are two that stand out for me. In October last year Danny Spooner hosted an evening in memory of Ewan MacColl. No one who was there will ever forget it. More recently in May, Judy Small played to our first full house at the 'East'. What a night that was!

There have also been many memorable sessions, thanks to the great musicians who turn up regularly every week. What a great way to finish up an evening.

One criticism I have received is that the programme at the Club is not varied enough-that there should be more multi-cultural music for example. I am not one to argue with this, but the fact remains that I do not know everything there is to know about the Melbourne music scene - far from it. In fact, none of us do, but if we could pool what we do know, it would benefit the Club. TELL ME if you see any great performers who would go over well at the Club. Why not take me up on the offer of hosting a night at the club yourself and introduce us to your favourite performers. Some of you have been doing this already and I thank you. Whilst on the subject of variety, it may be of interest to note that over the past year seventy eight different acts have been booked at the club, plus numerous floor spots.







I will have been organising the Melbourne Folk Club for two years in August and for the most part I have to say that I have enjoyed it and I am more than happy to continue. I also have to say that I could not do it without the support of some volunteers who give up their time every week to ensure that everything runs as smoothly as possible. My thanks to:

John Ross and his helpers for the brilliant, thankless job they do on the sound and to Jamie Johnston for setting up the sound gear almost every

week.

Heather Riches, Tony Falla and Annie McGlade for the terrific work they do on the handbills and posters.

Jeanette Gillespie for her support through the newsletter - Jeanette would love to hear from people interested in writing Folk Club Reviews.

Derek Brown and Coralie Collins for the work they do on the door, selling records and general P.R. - Derek is looking for assistance with this work. Hugh MacEwan for his unfailing support and continuing encouragement.

Finally, thank you to all the performers and session muso's who continue to provide consistently high quality entertainment. Your efforts are really appreciated - you can't be in it for the money!

A really noticeable trend at the Club is that on most occasions the audience is made up primarily of non members. Financially we are holding our head above water so we are not necessarily in need of your dollars, although they would be appreciated and whilst the performers would certainly be encouraged by the extra hands and faces (and dollars) out front, I am mostly concerned for you, our members, who are missing out - its a great venue, with plenty of room for all of you, a great club with plenty of atmosphere, so why not make the effort, come early have a good meal and make a night of it.



### RECENT DEATHS.

News has come to us of the recent passing of two folk identities whom many of you may have known: COLIN DREYDEN and DON HENDERSON. Graham McDonald of the APT heard, from friends, of Colin Dreyden's death in England, and says: "Having no firm information, I'm hoping that I am not doing a Mark Twain about this. But it occurred to us that Colin Dreyden was an artist remarkably undocumented. The only recording that I've ever seen was one song on an LP of the 1974 Newcastle Folk Festival. Surely there are more recordings extant? Maybe a cassette could be produced. In any case one of the collecting institutions here in Canberra would surely be pleased to add them to their collections." Don Henderson was a well-known Australian song-writer and folk artist. Three of his songs are printed in the VFMC's "Joy Durst Memorial Australian Song Collection". A couple of the more well-known ones are: "It's On" and "Put a Light in Every Country Window". Looks like that great folk session in the sky has a couple more starters!

### SINGERS GALORE!

It seems that a whole lot of people are either newly discovering or rediscovering the beauty of the human voice and the fun to be had in singing together. Yet another group of young harmony singers turned up at the Boite Singers Night on the 24th. Aug. - "just started singing rounds for fun over a few dinners". As well as Faye White and the Melbourne Short Women's Choir, there were eight different floor singers or groups, all well worth listening to. I've been running an occasional singing night at my house, too, the last one attracting twenty or so people. Many brought instruments as well, so that each person who sang was joined by an instant "backing band" of three harps, a fiddle or two, a couple of guitars and maybe a concertina, flute or mandola! 
### AURORA CLYDESDALE STUD WEEKEND - WAGGA

Incredible as it may seem, our esteemed Federal Government, that which is supposedly interested in promoting our "culture", has declined an invitation for Australia to be the featured country at the Smithsonian Institute's 1993 Festival of American Folklife. To give some indication of what an important event this is, try to imagine a dozen buildings of the size of the National Gallery on each side of a huge grassed mall area and think of turning it into a folk festival for 10 days every year! About a million people visit the festival every year, and forty million others see, hear or read something about it through the media. The Smithsonian's proposal was extensive, including the commissioning of a book on the Living Arts of Australia with an initial print run of 10,000. Reason given for declining? "No money". Can Australia be the only nation among the 48 who have been invited who cannot see the value of participation in such an event? Our government would appear to only want to affirm our reputation as a banana republic! However, the Australian Folk Trust is not giving up and letting the matter rest there. They are lobbying at the highest political levels, and they encourage folkies to make representation to their local federal members, so that the government can realize that this is a matter of national and immediate concern. As AFT chairperson, Dale Dengate says, "If we miss out on this one, we may as well give up and go back to bed."

# TREASURER'S REPORT FINANCIAL YEAR 1990/91.

I am pleased to present the audited accounts of the Folk Song and Dance Society of Victoria, for the financial year ending 30th. June 1991. Attached are the Auditor's Reports for 1989/90 and for 1990/91. Changes in the presentation of the financial statements are those recommended by the accountant who has audited the accounts of the Society for the past two years.

The F.S.D.S.V. accounts established previously have been maintained. These consist of:-

- \* A chequing/operating account (minimal interest), through which the majority of funds pass; utilised for the regular operations/business of the Society.
- \* A 'cash management'/investment account, established to maximise the investment potential for the reserve funds of the Society. The monthly deposits, set aside for the purpose of the maintenance of the Society's P.A. System, are also retained in this account.
- \* The National Festival account is now operated as a Term Deposit a/c. At the maturation of each term, interest earned is reinvested, together with the principal.
- \* The Grant monies have been deposited into a joint 'cash management' account which combines ease of access with maximum interest and minimum charges. Separate chequing accounts are also operated for each grant project.

The F.S.D.S.V. continues to be accorded the prestige of auspicing grant funds from The Victorian Ministry for the Arts, for the following projects:

- 1) The State Folk Arts Administrator; \$23,500, for the period 1/1/91 to 31/12/91
- 2) Feasibility Study into the establishment of a National Heritage and Folklife Centre; \$10,000. for the period 1/1/91 to 31/12/91

As the auspicing body for these grants the Society has earned interest monies, which the present Committee has determined shall be utilised solely in respect to the promotion of the folk arts.

The overall administrative costs of the Society have shown no substantial rise, due largely to a significant increase in the proportion of 'in kind services' offered by many of the members. While this level of generosity and support is highly reassuring, reliance on this pattern should not, and cannot continue to be assumed. As costs for all services will undoubtedly rise, realistic provision for such increases must be considered. It is both unfair and unprofessional to anticipate that members can continue to meet these expenses.

Membership numbers to the Society have continued to grow. Given the increased fee structure for the coming year it can now be reasonably expected that general administrative expenses, particularly those related to membership, folk club, newsletter, and promotion should be realistically provided for from Society funds.

This year's F.S.D.S.V. publicity costs were exceedingly low. The Society promotion brochures designed in the previous year are now in short supply and also out of date, so attention should be given to the production of effective, up to date promotional activities/materials.







While the overall downturn in today's economic climate has not left the Society untouched, the cumulative aspects of forward planning and careful management, together with the cooperation and support from the Committee and members alike has ensured the F.S.D.S.V. of another successful financial year.

The Folk Club has weathered an extremely difficult financial year. Meg MacDonald must be heartily congratulated for her persistence and sheer determination, which assisted her in

bringing the M.F.C. through some very trying months.

It has become evident that in order to retain the present Friday night format, which continues to provide quality entertainment, to maintain a stable level of payment to performers, to cover the charge for the P.A. maintenance fund as well as promotion and advertising costs, additional income must be generated. The highly successful Judy Small concert provided this necessary injection of funds, without which the financial viability of the Folk Club could not have survived.

For the past two years the Society has owned and operated its own P.A. system. A charge of 10% is made on Folk Club income and the monies apportioned from this source are utilised solely for the upgrade or replacement of the P.A. equipment. From funds thus accrued, the Society has been able to pay for the multi core cable which we previously had on loan and to purchase two high quality front of house speakers.

The record/cassette (and now C.D.) sales project has become a significant income earner for the Society. The business at the Folk Club has stabilised and has continued to improve as members have begun to take advantage of the selection and ordering services offered. Although we have not benefitted from Festival business this year, it is expected that future opportunities in this regard will be afforded the F.S.D.S.V..

Special Functions' this year have been largely the result of joint ventures with The Colonial Dancers, The Brunswick Music Festival and 'Across The Borders'. The Caledonian Review, from The Brunswick Music Festival, staged at the Melbourne Folk Club was highly successful in both the entertainment and promotional aspects and gave each organisation a small profit. Although the Vin Garbutt Concert, organised between the Society and Across The Borders netted no financial gain, it was an outstanding evening's entertainment. Once again, the Reel Tradition weekend, co-hosted with the Colonial Dancers was a huge success and proved financially rewarding for all parties.

This pattern is a reflection of the Society's increasing co-operation and involvement in the area of promotion of folk activities with other organizations, having similar philosophies and priorities. The stable financial situation of the Society allowed the Committee the confidence to contribute to the following promotional activities.

i) Membership to 3CR, plus a donation to their 'Radiothon' (\$160.00)

ii) Cost of advertising the Winter Workshop Series (\$153.00)

iii) Donation towards production costs of the Lis Johnston Memorial Album (\$750.00)

Involvement of this nature is indicative not only of the perceived overall improved profile of the F.S.D.S.V., but also of the increased level of esteem with which it views itself. It is to be hoped that the Society continues to seek opportunities for such collaboration and that it avails itself of these opportunities. In this way the image of the F.S.D.S.V. will be further enhanced and the interests of the folk arts served.

Once again I wish to express my appreciation towards the wholly supportive Committee with whom I have worked and to the committed membership, and I take this opportunity to indicate my willingness to serve another term in this position.




