writes with Geoff Francis. Don't miss him this time - he seems to get better each visit.

Red Pepper from Perth will be singing at the Club on August 5th, along with local choir, Just Add Water. This concert is an associated event of the Melbourne A Cappella Festival and we would love to see the East Brunswick Club Hotel packed to the rafters on that night. Red Pepper is a four member male a cappella group singing contemporary arrangements of everything from folk to jazz to rock'n'roll. Just Add Water was initiated by a group of people who attended Tony Backhouse's workshop during the first a cappella festival last year. The forty member group of male and female voices specialises in the singing of Black Gospel, spiritual and related styles. Keep the date free!

Enda Kenny has been touring Western Australian folk venues in June and Bruce Watson was a guest performer at the Top Half Folk Festival in Katherine, NT, on the Queen's Birthday weekend. Hopefully we can extract some tales from them!

## FROM THE PRESIDENT

This will be my last monthly report for Folkvine as next month's issue will carry my annual report, prepared for the A.G.M. Today, when discussing some book-keeping with Chris Garrity I found it difficult to believe that 12 months had passed since Sue and I had been finalising the Society's 93/94 financial statement and since I had been making the decision to stand for President. Its been a hectic but thoroughly rewarding year and my enthusiasm is still as high, and I hope as infectious as at this time last year.

The past month has been a busy one for folkies of all kinds, both in Melbourne and in country Victoria. From all accounts a good time was had by those who spent the long weekend in **Guildford/Castlemaine**, while those of us who went to **Bendigo** for the dance weekend run by the TSDAV and the Bendigo Bush Dance & Music Club had more of a **Ball** than we had anticipated.

One could have been forgiven for thinking that three days of dance workshops from Lisa and Anthony Simon from Sydney, plus musicians' and informal dance sessions with Moritz Gierisch and Stu(ie) Simms from the Gay Charmers, together with a Saturday night pub session and dance would have been sufficient excitement. However, we (the healthy ones without the dreaded flu) attired ourselves suitably and stepped out expectantly to enjoy the Sunday night Colonial Ball with the renowned Emu Creek Bush Band.

Our expectations were realised with a fantastic night of dancing, but what most of us did not expect was the announcement during the course of the evening of the award to **Shirley Andrews** of the **Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM).** Shirley, long known for her many, many years of involvement in, and her study and promotion of Australian traditional dancing, is a **Life Member** of the **FSDSV** and was the recipient in 1977 of the Society's **Graham Squance Memorial Award.** 

Congratulations Shirley! I was proud to be standing close enough to you to have the first hug and I know I speak for the members of the Society when I say how proud we are to have you as a member! Those who know Shirley will not be surprised that she was one of the first to the next morning's workshop, ready to run us through yet another version of the Lancers.

We hope Shirley will be one of the past recipients attending the 1994 Graham Squance Memorial Award at the Melbourne Folk Club on Friday 7th. October. Please mark the date indelibly on your calendar for what promises to be an exceptional night; with the talented line up of past 'awardees' as performers and with the old Jamie Johnston/John O'Leary team in the organisational harness, what else can you expect? Having undertaken to backstop for the J & J team should certainly keep me out of the wine bars for some time!

Committee members are highly satisfied with their choice of the recipient for the 1994 Squance Award; chosen from a number of names put forward; (all of whom would have been worthy candidates). Member's suggestions of possible recipients for this year's award were most welcome. This kind of involvement by members is indicative of the revived interest and I feel confidence of the membership in the direction the Society has been pursuing. Thanks to those who made time to respond.

The MFC working party has taken up the running for the next **Tasmanian Performer Exchange.** As a matter of interest, when the need has arisen, additional dollars to fund this program have come from the Winter Workshop a/c. Monies in this a/c, the balance of the workshop series run by Annie McGlade and funded by an AFT grant several years ago can still be made available to anyone interested in proposing **suitable workshop(s) activities.** 

Readers will recall the FSDSV sponsorship of the **Brunswick Music Festival** and this week we received a very welcome cheque from the organisers for our share of the monies from the Festival activities hosted by the Society at the E.B.C.H. The covering letter from John McAuslan reflected appreciation for our financial sponsorship and for the hard work of Society personnel involved.

The decision has been made to offer the 3CR. Radiothon being held this month the same level of financial sponsorship and donation as in previous years. Society members feature regularly as presenters and as live-to-air performers on the Monday night program, 'Traditionally Late' and we receive regular promotion and advertising assistance from the station. 3 C.R. continues to be the only Melbourne radio station with a minimum quota of 55% Australian content, hosting three folk music programs. Thanks to Peter Goodyear for keeping us involved.

Don't forget the **Sixth National Folklife Conference**, 'Traditions and Tourism: the good, the bad and the ugly,' being hosted by the VFA over the weekend of 8-10 July and of the AFT trustees meeting and forum the following Monday and Tuesday. See the flyer for additional conference information.

There are a number of plans on the drawing board for activities in the new membership year which would be made easier with the assistance of extra bodies. Areas include folk club responsibilities, promotion assistance with, for example the A Cappella Festival, concert organisation (maybe John Faulkner??), technical know how, eg. the P.A. system and Macintosh data base or word processing skills, and assistance and expertise in the compilation of recorded material.

It would be **great** to have some volunteers from among the general membership to take the reins for some of these, or some offers to be part of an organisational team, even just for one event. It would be even **greater** to have some proposals for activities you would like and some hands up to help

run them. It would be the greatest to receive lots of nominations for the Committee positions, all of which fall vacant at the A.G.M. Nomination forms are available at the desk at the M.F.C. every Friday or by phoning me. (03 480 1020)

I seem to have got a bit carried away this month but I did say that my enthusiasm had not waned with the weight of office! Member support this year has been a vital factor in sustaining the energy of your Committee. Please continue your support by attendance at the AGM on Sunday 31st. July.



Dear Friends of the Festival,

Wonderful news ... the Maleny Folk Festival is alive and well ... after much negotiating, fundraising and heartburn we have finally secured a wonderful venue for the event - a permanent home.

Things were very difficult and at one stage it seemed that we were finished. But ... the harder it gets, the better the result. The land is a magnificent 260 acres, much of which is a hidden valley in the shadow of the Conondale Ranges near Woodford. Hurrah - views of the Glasshouse Mountains, fresh water and swimming, neighbouring State Forest in a very beautiful setting and no more crushed camping. It's the best site of hundreds we've looked at. It is situated near Woodford, around 20 minutes drive south of Maleny.

We take over the site at the end of July and work begins to build Paradise in time for the New Year.

We're now advanced in our planning for the next Maleny Folk Festival. It will be our best yet, particularly with the excitement generated by the new site. ### On The Track With Bill Bowyang

by **Hugh Anderson**, with bush recitations edited by **Dawn Anderson**. Published by **Red Rooster Press**, 13 Fernhill St, Ascot Vale, 3032. Six Volumes. \$75.00 plus \$5.00 postage.

You should buy this book! For years I've longed for a book I could review and unreservedly recommend and this is it. Actually it's six books including all the Bill Bowyang reciters with a biography of Bowyang himself. "Who was Bill Bowyang?" I hear you cry. The Oxford Companion to Australian Folklore has this entry:

"VENNARD, ALEXANDER VINDEX (BILL BOWYANG) (1884 - 1947): Journalist, publisher and occasional swagman, Vennard took Bill Bowyang as a penname around 1915 and also published as 'Frank Reid'. His main claim to fame is as the editor of a column in the North Queensland Register called 'On The Track' which ran from 1922 until 1947. The column published verse, song and other items of bush lore, mostly contributed by readers. The popularity of the column led Vennard to publish selections from his column in at least nine volumes between 1933 and 1940. These were variously titled 'Old Bush Recitations', Australian Bush Recitations' and 'Bill Bowyang's Bush Recitations' but were more generally known as 'Bill Bowyang Reciters'."

These anthologies became rare. No library or person had a complete set. Now Red Rooster Press, after assiduous research and great effort, has tracked down all of them and reprinted the lot. The biography of Vennard is great reading. Fittingly he was a Gallipoli veteran. His newspaper column had a vast readership. I know "A Pub With No Bear" appeared there in 1944.

There are some peculiarities in the reciters. Authors are never named and some poems are reprinted in successive volumes. The reasons for this are speculated on in the biography.

There are lots of items we would call old bush songs. Did singers send in the words of songs they knew or readers take the poems and put them to tunes? A bit of both I suppose.

My wife's Aunty Ivy used to sing "The Gatton Tragedy" which is printed here (three times!). Did she get it from Bill Bowyang? For years I worked with a man who used to say at every meal break: "We was all in a bunch having our lunch". Now I see it's the first line of a poem called "The Skite". Fascinating stuff.

I can't pretend it's all of a high standard. "The Face On The Bar Room Floor" is hardly a work of art. But these Reciters are a selection of the most popular. Aspiring bush poets (and there's a lot of it around!) could learn a lot about ballad writing from these volumes.

I'm grateful to Hugh and Dawn Anderson for reprinting the Reciters. How wonderful to have them available.

#### Who Are The Witches?

Pagan singer/ songwriter Phillip Day has recently released a second cassette entitled "Who Are The Witches: Songs For Pagans" Where the first cassette "The Alchemist" was a collection of original songs in a pagan world-view, the new cassette is specially pagan, and includes Charlie Murphy's "The Burning Times" and Linda Arnold's "Who Are The Witches", the title track.

The other songs on the cassette, with the exception of Sean Mangan's "The Dancing Ground" are originals by Phillip - "The Alchemist", "Feet of Clay", "Sacred Marriage", "Salisbury Hill" and a rewrite of Sidney Carter's "The Lord of the Dance". [The two tracks marked \* appear on both cassettes, but have been re-recorded and re-arranged.]
