



Events include the New Year's Eve Street Dance, Family Bush Dance, Poets' Breakfast, Yarn Spinning & Storytelling, and Blackboard 'open' sessions. Events usually start at 10 am with scheduled performances/workshops continuing throughout the day and into the evening. As always, there will be traditional Folk music and dancing - both Australian/ Anglo and International, plenty of Irish music and blues plus a Kids' Festival. Enjoy 3 days of dance workshops – American Contra, Irish Set, Bush and Square Dancing. Presenters are Julie & Alex Bishop, Jan & Vic Orloff, Pat Dobson, and Earthly Delights. Performers include Duncan Chalmers, David Byers, Margaret Bradford, Lemon Tart, Archie Bishop and Yuri.



The Cygnet Folk Festival celebrates its 19th consecutive year in 2001. The halls, pubs, cafes and streets of Cygnet will be filled with music, dance, and sessions. This is a great opportunity to check out the breadth of Tasmanian performers, old and new, including singer/songwriters, folk groups, dance bands, contemporary ensembles, circus stars, visual and multimedia artists and poets. 

Sistajive Women's Music festival is the only onsite women's music and arts festival weekend in Australia. Two stages will feature both well-known and emerging artists. This year's performers include: The Stiff Gins - a dynamic Aboriginal trio from Sydney; Jan Preston - Sydney's Queen of Blues; Alix Dobkin – Lesbian icon from the USA; Rachel Hore (well known for her performances with Arramaeida); Ekhosi Multicultural Women's Choir, Cynthia Delaney & the Gypsy Flame Bellydancers; Peggy Van Zalm (from Martha's Vineyard) and Kerrianne Cox –Aboriginal singer-songwriter from Broome. Workshops include Belly Dancing, Drumming, Sacred Play, Comedy, Singing, Songwriting, Aboriginal Culture, Yoga, Zine Making, and Spirituality.

The festival site is a 1 1/2 hour drive down the South coast from Sydney. Set on tranquil Lake Illawarra, the conference centre site has sprawling, treed grounds with onsite cabins, a few private caravans nearby, or shady camping. There are fire pits, a pool, tennis and squash courts, a large hall and good disability access. For the first time this year there will be multicultural food stalls from the local community, plus. Women will be selling their craft wares in the colourful craft area. National community women's and lesbian organisations will offer health information, networking and massage in the healing tent. The Festival opens with a ceremony led by the local women elders from the Wodi Wodi tribe, followed by a concert. It continues all day and night Saturday until Sunday at 4pm.

Kidspeak - June Factor

Hot off the presses is a dictionary of children's folklore called Kidspeak, a Dictionary of Australian Children's Words, Expressions and Games, compiled by Dr. June Factor, Australia's leading expert on children's lore. The book contains almost 4,500 entries, listing 'everyday words and expressions, including slang, used by Australian children and teenagers, now and in the past'. Judy McKinty spoke with Dr. Factor about the Dictionary, which was launched on November 14 at the new Melbourne Museum.

JMcK: June, can you tell me how you came to write the dictionary?

JF: In books like Far Out, Brussel Sprout and All Right, Vegemite. I have a letter inviting children to write to me and send me their rhymes, riddles, jokes, sayings, and so on. I get a steady stream of letters from children and the occasional adult, and the occasional classroom of children if a teacher encourages them to write. These have been arriving since Far Out was published just before Christmas 1983. One of the lovely things about getting the letters, and then sending these children Collection Sheets for the dictionary, is that it means I have got material from all over the country - from the most tiny rural community to all the major cities.

I've always been fascinated by the kind of language that kids use, as well as the material they actually send me - the way they write a letter. Somewhere in the early 1990s, formed the idea that it would be interesting to see if I could collate some of the words and expressions that children use, not only in the letters but also generally. I was interested in the colloquial, in the vernacular. Colloquial generally refers to language that is everyday, unofficial, non-formal, easygoing, slang, (most of it not peculiar to the young - adults speak colloquially as well). Vernacular tends to focus more on place or group. For example you might have the colloquial vernacular of the workplace, or you might say that a particular Aboriginal community in the Kimberley speaks a particular kind of vernacular, or a particular dialect, or whatever. So one tends to emphasise the kind of language and the other tends to emphasise group and place, but basically they're very closely related. I was very interested in both these aspects.

For a very long time I've been examining what children do when nobody tells them to do anything. I'm also interested in how they communicate in these situations. Long ago I realised that there are many sub-cultures of childhood, which may be based on something as small as a group of kids who set up a secret society and have a password, or it may encompass a much larger group, for example teenage boys in Melbourne in the mid-1970s. The dictionary reflects

both those extremes, and much in between. The only language use I haven't included is what's called idiolect, that is the made-up language of an individual. Children are great language inventors. There are a handful of linguistically inventive children in every classroom, and I think that's great fun and something for teachers to



encourage - the more creativity and inventiveness of language, the greater the mastery of language.

But I was trying to find what children had in common. A word like cool, for example, is recognised and probably used across Australia now. Whereas a term like budju came from high-school kids in Darwin ,and doesn't seem to be used outside the Northern Territory. Budju, the children told me, means someone good-looking - a good-looking girl or a good-looking bloke. So you might say, 'I saw you out with a budju fella last night'. None of the Aboriginal language dictionaries that I looked at had anything like it, but I had it confirmed by a number of adults as well, and for them it meant sexual intercourse. As sometimes happens, a word which has a very specific meaning among adults may have a much more diffuse meaning among the young.

Another very good example of this is poof. In colloquial Australian, a poof is a homosexual. It's generally derogatory - it's a put-down word. However, some children said that poof means a fat old man, or a silly old man. It has retained its pejorative flavour, but for some children it has no sexual implications.

Kidspeak

My definition of a child, for the purposes of the book, is anyone of school age - about four-and-a-half to about eighteen. Language patterns and traditions may vary according to age, gender, a particular interest, ethnicity, or the accident of locality.

JMcK: Some of the words have different connotations, and some will be looked on with horror by adults. Can you tell me if you had any problems putting those words in the dictionary?


JF: My initial publisher, Collins Dove, was very excited about the book, but I think they became worried about the effect that publishing a book of this kind might have on the sale of other of their books, and they withdrew from the project. Melbourne University Press appears not to be disturbed by the vulgar and obscene expressions which are an inevitable part of any honest dictionary of this kind. I will be very interested to see how the book is received.

I make the point early in Kidspeak that it's not appropriate for someone making a dictionary to act as a censor, and I certainly haven't. I know that there is still a censorial subset of the Australian community. It's small, I think, but it gets particularly excited and uneasy when it comes to children. So it's possible that there will be children who will not be permitted to look at the language of children, because the book will be declared not suitable for children.

When the first major Australian collection of children's playground lore (Cinderella Dressed in Yella edited by the late Ian Turner) was published in 1969, it caused a stir: the Melbourne Post Office didn't want to give the publishers the subsidy for sending books in bulk because Cinderella was considered obscene. But by the time I co-edited the second edition with Ian Turner and Wendy Lowenstein in 1978, nobody seemed to raise an eyebrow. However, while the censors have been quiet for a time, they always seem to rise again. In particular they have a well-meaning but misplaced desire to shield children from 'bad language'. Not all children use vulgarity. Most come into some contact with it, not all choose to use it . It doesn't, I think, corrupt.

spaghetti - a hospital term, when intravenous drip lines get tangled or twisted

underbum - Elastics term; one of the levels at which the elastic is set

wunyarn - cute, appealing. Proper wunyarn baby is a Kimberley Creole expression.

yonny - a stone for throwing

Earthbound

Merrilyn Simmons

'A turquoise hat with a mandarin rim' - winner of Australian Songwriters' Award 1998 & 1999, Merrilyn Simmons states her intention of individuality and sense of taste and style from the first verse of the first song of her first CD Earthbound. One look at the list of musicians credited assures that this will indeed be a finely crafted hat. Simmons sings with an unaffected voice, distinctly Australian and sweet and 'girl-like' in quality. As the CD back cover photo testifies, she is not concerned with image (it's a photo of Simmons' back, sitting next to an old boat shed looking out over a river). Simmons lets her tales of domestic life and love, and longing for a fresher and simpler existence tell her story. Definitely on the pop side of country, or the folk side of rock, Earthbound is a light and breezy walk through the scrub, with moments of contemplation speckled freely and thoughtfully. Self-penned and produced acoustic-based stories told through the eyes of a mature and sensitive ensemble band setting.

Australian Folk 2000

Folk Alliance Australia (Compilation)

Any CD that begins with a track by The Waifs, followed by Shane Howard, promises to be a work of quality. Folk Alliance Australia's Australian Folk 2000, certainly proves to be such a work. Financed through the assistance of APRA and the Alan C. Rose Memorial Fund, this 2 CD package provides an insight into the current Australian folk scene. If you're feeling out of touch with Australian music that is honest in approach and spirit, then go out and buy this CD. It reminded me of being at a folk festival, getting the taste of different styles and stories. Highlight for me is Tiffany Eckhardt's Think about you, my clear choice for the song of 2000. But each person will take away something different with them from this CD. CD 1 is of more contemporary songs and tends to follow the format of an uptempo track followed by a slower or ballad-type song. This makes for a surprisingly smooth flow. CD 2 leans more towards traditional styles, which means lots of singer-songwriter stuff (plus a great guitar instrumental by Craig Dawson). Definite mention should be made of the high fidelity sound quality. Not only is it a delightfully mastered product but the overall sounds of instruments, acoustic guitars et al, is of a fine clarity - something that all Australians should take pride in; the sound of our local artists is of the highest standard.

One Way Ticket

Paul Wookey

I love this CD. Paul Wookey is a marvelously refined and thoughtful songwriter and acoustic guitarist. He states that his guitar was made by John McGrath of Geelong; this is a sure sign of how much pride and effort he places in sound and craft. Wookey was well known in the acoustic/folk scene, especially in Melbourne, in the 70s and 80s. He has supported many international artists, won awards and played overseas. It is a delight to see him return with this finely performed and produced CD. The voice and acoustic guitar are the focus (and often just by themselves), with thoughtful accompaniment from Fiddle, Mandolin, Didjeridoo, Double Bass, Harmonica, Recorder and Cello. Wookey embraces story folk songs, Appalachian country tunes (love the occasional yodel!), talking blues, acoustic finger picking melodies and ragtime sliding and swaying goodtime ditties. This is a CD of substance and is timeless in feel and look.

Songs from the Back Room

The Round Records Collection

This is a compilation CD from Adelaide, showcasing the wide and varied talents of nationally unknown and lesserknown artists who have found their way onto the Round Records label. Most tracks seem to be produced by Terry Bradford, who also appears to be the source of inspiration and hard work for getting this CD together. The CD starts with melodic pop/rock, moves into more acoustic territory, and then just takes off into all areas, sometimes at once. This is a CD that represents one person's taste in and passion for Adelaide music. There is boogie bar blues, an Irish lament and acoustic pop. I was familiar with Paul Wookey, an expected solid performance and The Every Brothers (who I always remember having a female bass player...) with This Town. Highlight for me is Black Taxi's Traffic Jam, a song that reminds me of watching Doris Day movies on rainy Sunday afternoons back in the times when TV was black and white.

Music Of The Diggings

Songs and Tunes of the Victorian Goldfields

This CD should be a treat for anyone interested in Australian traditional music with its pleasing mixture of folk revival and traditional/old time performances. Included with the CD is a 24 page booklet providing background information on the performers and the music.

The material presented is an amalgam of orally collected items and the compositions of professional entertainers of the goldrush era such as Charles Thatcher. The CD is not confined in its subject matter to gold mining and the gold rushes but covers social life on the Central Victorian goldfields in all its aspects. The goldfields are defined as 'the area in Central Victoria from Ballarat to Bendigo, and from Maryborough to Kyneton'. The performers include Danny Spooner, Duncan Brown, Dave De Hugard, Peter Ellis, Ken Mansell, Dave Barkla, Jack Heagney, Tom Walsh, Maurie Gervasoni, Des Skinner, Alby Hood, Thompson's Foundry Brass Band, Emu Creek Bush Band and others who are all residents or former residents of the goldfields area.

The collection commences with Danny Spooner singing With My Swag All On My Shoulder accompanied by solo concertina and vocal chorus. Danny performs Charles Thatcher's Look Out Below and E.J. Overbury's The Wallaby Track in the same distinctive forthright manner. When Jones's Ale Was New, collected from Simon McDonald of Creswick, is also included with Danny, Duncan Brown, Ken Mansell and Dave De Hugard all sharing the vocal lead. This song is performed in the traditional acapella fashion with all the singers joining in the choruses. Dave De Hugard puts his unmistakable stamp on two more Thatcher songs, Bryant's Ranges and Scrumptious Young Girls and also provides accordion accompaniment for Ken Mansell's unusual version of The Wild Colonial Boy.

The first instrumental selection encountered is of Swiss-Italian tunes played in the Yandoit/Daylesford district. This track includes two 'Gervasoni' waltzes and two Italian set tunes featuring Maurie Gervasoni on accordion, Des Skinner on Dobro and Dave De Hugard on fiddle. As well as showcasing Maurie's accordion style these tunes illustrate Des Skinner's unique Dobro playing which he has developed over the years to suit old-time dance music. Des also ably accompanies Peter Ellis and Jack Heagney on Jack and Marie's Waltz, Goodbye My Bluebell and My Polly on track 17.

Although Harry McQueen, dance band leader in the goldfields for over fifty years, has been dead for several years his legacy lives on. He is represented on this CD with two selections by Dave Barkla and the Emu Creek Bush Band. The Emu Creek Bush Band play regularly around Bendigo and the tunes they play here were passed on to them by Harry McQueen who learned them from his mentor

Bill McGlashan who played in the area from 1900 until the late 1930s. Dave Barkla, a long-time member of McQueen's dance band, plays two waltzes, two polka-mazurkas and a schottische all learned from Harry McQueen. Other instrumental selections include Tom Walsh's idiosyncratic *Uncle Ned's Waltz* while Tom joins Alby Hood for the Irish derived waltz *Love Is Pleasing*.

Finally the brass band tradition of the goldfields is represented by Thompson's Foundry Brass Band playing the *Hymn St Clement*. Brass band music on the diggings is reported from as early as 1851 while Thompson's Foundry Brass Band has a continuous performing history from 1886. It is pleasing to hear this often ignored type of folk music included in this collection. The 24-page booklet included with the CD provides interesting background and finishes off a neat package that should interest lovers of traditional Australian music.






