Vale Derek Brown

We were recently shocked and saddened to learn of the sudden death of long time FSDSV member, past president, musician, music lover, Morris dancer and beloved friend, Derek Brown. Derek passed away suddenly and unexpectedly of a heart attack whist chatting to friends

moments before he was to take part in a Morris Dance Display at Kellybrook Winery on Saturday, May 3rd.

Many of us were looking forward to Derek's 60th birthday party the following Saturday. We instead took part in a funeral and wake to farewell him and to honour and celebrate his life.

Derek had been closely involved with the running of the Folk Song and Dance Society of Victoria in the 1980's and early 90's and was part of the group which organised the 1986 National Folk Festival in Melbourne. As time moved on, his love of the banjo and of Morris Dancing took precedence. Derek and his banjo were familiar sights at the Quiet Man and other Irish sessions around town, and he became a fully fledged member of the Britannia Morris Team, dancing and socialising regularly with them.

Derek's commitment to social justice, equality and peace were among many other areas of his life which were spoken of at his funeral.

Derek's family and partner were of course very precious to him, and we have passed on our condolences and sincere best wishes to his son Andrew and daughter Jacqueline and their respective families, and to his loving partner, Angie McGowan.

Vale Derek. We miss you but we know yours was a life lived to the full.

National Folk Festival

Coralie and I were friends through many years and shared our lives in big things and small: happiness and heartbreak, laughter and tears, achievements and disappointments, music and books, meals and shopping...and so much more...even on one week-end last year, her dancing shoes! The friendship between us, we realised, was a gift, and we treasured it. Yet now, as so many memories fill my mind, I find myself struggling to write about her...and I feel overwhelmed.
