WHAT'S ON AT VICTORIAN FOLK MUSIC CLUB

<u>Session nights</u>: The Club meets **each Tuesday** evening at **Ringwood Uniting** Church Hall, 30-32 Station Street. Sessions run from 7.45 pm to 9.15 pm. The format varies each week of the month, and visitors are welcome to attend and join in, or just sit and observe if preferred.

Week 1 & 3 Round Robin: singing, playing, reciting, yarns, solo, group, etc.

Week 4 All-In Session: group playing of set tunes, dance sets, group singing

Week 5 Theme Night: workshops, 'Hot Spots' or open stage nights

Admission for **Round Robin** and **All-in Sessions** is \$6 for members, \$7 non-members. Cash at the door or pay by card. Accompanied children no charge.

<u>Concerts</u>: Tuesday of Week 2, featuring top acoustic performers plus floor spots. The concert is from 7.45 to 10pm with a supper break at 8.45pm. Same hall as the sessions. Admission is \$10 members to \$14, cash or card at the door or purchase tickets online from Humanitix. Accompanied children no charge.

<u>Dance Events</u>: Family Bush Dance 1st Saturday evening each month except January, Ringwood East Senior Citizen's Hall. Bands vary and dances called. Admission is \$10 members to \$12. No charge for accompanied children.

Children's Dance is 2-3pm on 3rd Saturday during school terms. \$5 per child or \$10 per family. Accompanying adults no charge.

Online access via Zoom: Zoom access for Sessions will be available on Week 1 of the month for those unable to attend the venue. Post Event access to Concerts on Week 2 is available. Tickets must be bought in advance via Humanitix.

CONCERT NIGHT REVIEW—AUGUST 2023

Maree Buttler was the MC for the evening. The **SPOT ACTS** were as follows:

Ed Robbins is one of our popular singer/songwriters and entertained the audience with what he called a dog's tale. It tells a slightly different story about the famed bronze statue of a drover's dog who made a *pit stop* at a popular spot five miles from the NSW town of Gundagai. Then a song of *Reflection* about his nostalgic trip back to his childhood town of Dartmoor and environs where the general store and the pub are no longer standing.





Maggie Somerville performed a song about attempts to deal with the memories and pain of the death of her son. As the years go by there are *Triggers* which never go away. They can pop up unexpectedly, causing a person to constantly deal with their grief. Henry Lawson wrote a poem in 1889 called *Cinderella*, which Maggie has set to music. In olden times fairies always righted wrongs and magically granted a poor girl's wishes. Alas, Lawson

states, fairies have disappeared and Cinderellas now wait in vain.

Peter from Healesville is also a singer/songwriter and entertained with two original songs. First was *Nariel Creek Carol*. His words describe the beauty of the sparkling waters of the creek and his lyrics gave the listener pause for thought such as: You cannot step twice into the same river. The ballad of *Billy the Baker from Bermagui*. Bernie loved Rebecca but she was promised to another, the local rock'n'roll man was her lover.





John said his love of music goes back to the folk era of the 1960s. Tonight he played the banjo and presented an old American Civil war song originally by famed Appallachian banjoist Frank Proffitt of North Carolina. A man sings *Oh Faretheewell* to his wife as he leaves home to cross the mountains to join the boys in blue. He followed up with another song about *Both Sides of the Road*.

Joan Mundy on piano accordion and husband Ray accompanying on guitar played a lively dance tune written by John Sheahan, a fiddle player with the Dubliners, a well-known Irish group from the 1960's. Then Joan led the audience in song with a rendition of *The Tennessee Waltz*. First released in 1948, this song's popularity has stood the test of time.

The last act before supper was Dominic Martin who accompanied himself on guitar as he sang *John o' Dreams*. The late Bill Caddick, an English musician/singer/songwriter, used the music of Tchaikovsky's *Pathetique Symphony* as a background for his beautifully constructed poem. John o' Dreams represents the Sandman who watches over everybody, the rich and poor, the freeman and the slave, all peoples as they sleep and prepare themselves for the new day. The audience was happy to join in when Dominic played an old hit of the Weavers, *Irene Good*

Night. The song dates back to around 1908 and was created by Leadbelly, the well-known Louisiana musician, as he sang his niece Irene to sleep.

MAIN ACT:

Our main act for August was well-known folksinger/songwriter Michael Waugh who was accompanied on the night by guitarist Riley Catherall. Michael's strong vibrant voice filled the room as he presented his songs composed by the many and varied experiences of his own life growing up in Maffra in Gippsland. The first was inspired by his grand-daughter, with the lyrics emphasizing the importance of enjoying the moment —



Treasure every single moment of your life, you don't get to live it twice. Then he took us back in time to his teenage years up on a local hill on a Saturday arvo drinking with his mates, looking for a better place to go...

Michael's love and affection for his parents shines through his songs with the first a tribute to his dairy farmer father. Featuring a guitar solo by Riley, the song says: wherever I am I want to wear my dad's shoes. Michael gestures towards his own Blundstone boots proudly displaying rainbow coloured ribs. These traditional Aussie work boots date back to bootmaker John Blundstone in Hobart who made the first pair in 1870. These days Blunnies are still hugely popular and are now in demand all over the world.

CONCERT NIGHT REPORT (continued):-

Both of his parents died within weeks of each other just before lockdown so that Michael had long, lonely times in which to process his thoughts and feelings. His father taught him all of the important things in life: humanity and humour, integrity and fairness, and also how to eat Chinese food!

A song inspired by his work as a teacher, *Footy Trip* is an anthem for toxic masculinity. His students embraced the song with gusto and the entire group requested and sang it at their final year formal dinner.

Riley Catherall was joined by Gabrielle Parker from the audience and they sang a beautiful duet, *When I Go*.

The next song Michael described as a hero's story. It is about being true to yourself. The audience joined in the chorus as he sang... "we are here, we've always been here, watching from the shadows."

Beauty and Truth is a subtle and emotional tale of a young man trying his very best to play society's roles, at the same time searching for beauty and truth.

Heyfield is a timber town and Michael sang a soft and gentle tune dedicated to his mother because, he said, people don't write pretty songs about Heyfield girls at all. Then he sang the title song from his album *The Cast* asking the question. Going back to childhood days when everyone would write a word or two of encouragement on your plaster cast if you broke a limb. *When I lose my grip and start to fall will you sign my cast?*

Michael and Riley's guitar playing and harmonies and their warm friendly natures added an intimacy to the evening, and the audience encouraged them to perform an encore. Once again, Michael sang a tribute song honouring his mother and countless other strong country women who worked long, difficult hours at Willie's Chicken Factory in Glenmaggie.

Thank you to Michael, Riley and Gabrielle for a great night's entertainment, and the club hopes to see you again in the future.

Next month: A'Cappella Night features three groups: Voice Box, The Enterprize Shanty Band and VoKallista.

VFMC Committee supports the Voice

The VFMC Committee at the recent August meeting considered and agreed to a suggestion that it formally declare support for constitutional recognition of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in the Australian Constitution at the coming referendum.

The situation in Australia has come into focus through the campaigning of First Nations people culminating in the May 2017 Uluru Statement from the Heart and the federal government's initiative to hold a referendum to recognise the First Peoples of Australia in the constitution by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice.

The Committee felt it was appropriate to record its support for the Voice. Discussions touched upon the traditions of folk music and many well-known folk artists and musicians who over the years have been notable voices supporting struggles for equality and justice for peoples who have historically suffered due to their race or position in their societies. It was noted that many organisations across society, including community groups, businesses, universities, churches, law and other such organisations have formally stated their support.

In making its decision, the Committee recognises and respects that diverse views may be held among our members on this matter.

The Committee also agreed to a short statement of support appearing on the VFMC website.
